CO-WHEELS CAR CLUB

Imagine this scenario. Great Uncle Wilfrid and Great Aunt Gladys are coming to visit from Perth, Western Australia. They haven't been in Aberdeen since not long after the Cummings Park area was built. Aberdeen is receiving its normal heavenly rinse, or if you prefer the phrase, it's raining cats and dogs. You suddenly realise that they might not want to wait for a bus at the airport (they're arriving at 1.30 in the morning) nor struggle up from the Haudagain with loads of luggage. You don't own a car, none of your friends are available to help, and the idea of hiring a car from conventional car hire companies isn't a viable option.

Maybe it's not as dramatic as that. It might just be that your wife has been in town, done some shopping, and managed to get the heel of her shoe broken off in a drain grating. Taxi firms want an arm and a leg (with or without the shoe!) to bring her home, and to be quite honest, you feel that you could do better by hanging on to the aforesaid limbs.

The point is, you need transport, and you need it now. This is where Co-wheels Car Club comes to your rescue. You don't want to travel hundreds of miles, you don't want to hang onto the car for a whole day, and you don't want to pay an enormous tariff for what is essentially a short-term problem.

Tony Archer, who is the location manager for Scotland for Cowheels, reckons this is the kind of situation that tends to affect people and cause them unnecessary anxiety. The whole idea behind the organisation is that you can have the use of a car for short distances and for a short time, and that's what you pay for. There are around fortyeight cars distributed throughout Aberdeen, several of them in the Northfield and Mastrick areas. When you become a member of the club, it's a simple matter to locate the nearest car, book it and return it and be charged only for the use you have made of it. There are cars located in the Byron Square car park, the Middlefield Community Hub car park and on Mastrick Road. These are all clearly marked and have their own parking spaces.

"It's like the final mile of your journey", Tony told me. "Everybody has been in the situation where they don't own a car, but could make good use of one for a short period. Fetching relatives from the airport, the railway or bus station, or making similar short journeys gives you convenience without involving huge expense. Maybe your kids are coming home from school at the end of term with all their artwork, or maybe all those lost trainers weren't quite as lost as all that, and teachers have insisted

on cleaning out all the stuff that has accumulated over the term. There's any number of reasons why you might want a car for a short distance and a short time; being able to get hold of one at short notice just to do the job you intended makes sense, and it can all be done online."

It's a forward-looking organisation, and when it was suggested to him that some disabled people may be able to make some use of it, he was quite interested. Obviously, some disabled people need custom-made adaptations before they can make use of a car, but quite a large number need only modest modifications of the kind that can be attached and detached in seconds. "We need to think about this. Technology is advancing all the time, and hybrid and all electric cars form a reasonable proportion of our stock. This does away with the body about how much fuel has been used, and how to calculate that. Electric cars are quite efficient around town, and that's the kind of market we are aiming at.

Pathways in Cummings Park

Pathways have been actively working in Cummings Park helping people to find work for many years now and our Employability Keyworker, Theresa Mackay, meets with people in Cummings Park Community Flat, 122 Cummings Park Drive on Tuesdays from 1– 2pm.

Theresa has helped many people to find work across many industries. One of Theresa's clients came to see her for assistance after leaving college with no idea of how to proceed. Theresa re-worked his CV, helped with job applications and coached him through interview techniques. Theresa also provided confidence building exercises. He successfully applied for a job at a local supermarket and is still employed today.

Pathways help anyone from the age of 16 upwards and help to identify the job or training that is right for you and support you with the application process. We also have access to funds to remove barriers to work e.g. clothing or equipment.

Currently Pathways are administrating the Progress Through Positive Partnership Programme on behalf of Aberdeen City Council. Speak to us to find out if you are eligible for this programme.

Alison Taylor



Carol Hannaford Development Officer for Tenant & Resident Participation and Fay Morrison Housing Volunteer

Aberdeen City Council is an award-winning organisation with regards to tenant and resident participation. Fay and I would like to tell you how you can get involved, the benefits of getting involved and how working together can improve the services you receive.

We have many citywide groups which you can join

Tenant & Resident Forum – which looks at various reports as well as having speakers along to explain in more detail the changes taking place in the Council

Housing Service Review Group this group works with the Council to physically review services you receive. Members of the group spent time at all the Housing Offices during the Housing Management Review and have been recently at Kittybrewster doing a review of the Repairs Service. They produce a report with recommendations which the Council either accept or reject - if a recommendation is rejected then the Council Service has to say why. Copies of the reports are available for you to read or come along to the next meeting and just

see what it is all about. It is a great way to improve your CV or to get out of the house for a couple of hours. There is also a sub group – Housing Performance & Budget Group which looks at the Housing Revenue Account – this is where the rent money goes, the Tenant Participation Budget as well as the facts and figures about the Housing Service and you don't have to be an accountant to understand.

The Events and Communication Group plans various events throughout the year as well as works with the Council to produce Newsbite – a magazine which all tenants should receive. This group also looks at leaflets to ensure that all are easy to understand – they get the customer approved logo

We also have two specific groups

– one for all our Sheltered Housing
Tenants and one for all our Multi
Storey Tenants and Residents

As well as citywide groups we also have area tenant and resident groups supported by your Housing Officer so why not contact your local Housing Office to find out if there is a group in your area or perhaps you would like to start one.

To make it as easy as possible for you all reasonable costs are covered but we know attending meetings does not suit everyone so we are starting an armchair group – all you need is an email address – we will email you and if you want to participate then it is your choice.

Aberdeen City Council wants to work with our tenants to improve communication and consultation with you but also the services we deliver so it is over to Fay to tell you the difference getting involved has made to her:

"I joined the TP (Tenant Participation) group to see what I could do about the area that I live in. I tried to organise groups so that I could take back information about how rent money is spent and other council issues that the community might be interested in. I personally found the group very friendly and supporting of each other. We go to other council associations to meet other tenants and discuss issues that are always ongoing. The groups are open to tenants and residents. Everyone is welcome so come along and take part."

councillors comment

Last time I advised how the administration were dedicated to improving opportunities for the residents of Northfield/Mastrick North Ward, as you can see that these efforts are beginning to bear fruit.

On Friday 15th December, along with members of the Northfield Parent Council and Council Officers we conducted the interview process for a new Head Teacher at Northfield Academy. I can announce that following a successful interview Gavin Morrison is our preferred candidate for the Head Teacher post. Gavin is currently a Quality Improvement Officer with Aberdeenshire Council and prior to that was Acting Head Teacher at Peterhead Academy. I feel confident that Gavin will do a good job and build on the reputation and good standing the school enjoys.

A lot of work is happening at Heathryfold Park which will be of benefit to residents of Northfield and Cummings Park.

The new Community Hub at the refurbished Henry Rae Centre is proving to be very popular with people. I am proud of the part I played in the development and will continue to work with the Management Committee to ensure that it builds on the success.

A lot of work is going on as we transform Heathryfold Park, the name was decided by a steering group formed to oversee the improvements.

ACC now leases ground from Heathryfold Allotment Association, for a minimum term of 99 years. This is for the ground required to implement the Flood Prevention Works. The flood alleviation works is due for completion in March 2018.

Scottish Natural Heritage has provided £426,813 to improve this Park. A Park Ranger is to be recruited shortly.

Following road safety concerns from people using the new Community Hub Nestrans have offered £150,500 to:

- improve the crossings of Provost Rust Drive and Manor Avenue and provide directional signs. These are due to be completed in March.

We have received an award of £469,093.83 from Sustrans to improve the accessibility of the footpaths across the park for pedestrians and cyclists; this will connect to other cycleways on Auchmill Road and beyond. These are also due for completion in March.

We have been engaging with the Oldtown residents, we have now secured new LED lighting to replace the current street light bulbs, and this should now make the area brighter for those walking around during the darker evenings. We have also asked the community wardens to work closely with Police Scotland to make more visible patrols in the area to try and curb any anti-social behaviour along with holding 'meet your warden' sessions.

We have also been approached in regard to users of the 3G football pitch at Northfield Academy and the parking needs surrounding this, we are working with Sport Aberdeen to encourage those who do use the pitch, to park at the academy. This allows residents the

ability to park near their properties.

We were approached late last year about the speeding on Springhill Road, we asked for a speed survey to be carried out we have now received the results, and this has actioned Police Scotland and Aberdeen City Council are looking to invest in and deploy mobile speed signs in the area to try and make drivers aware of the speed limits. Police Scotland has been out and will continue to be in the area to hold driver education stops where speeding take place. On the back of this, we raised the matter of lack of school patrollers around Heathryburn and Orchard Brae Primary schools and have got the council to re-advertise these positions. If you wish to become a school patroller, please get

2:30 and 4:30pm, offering a dropin support service.

During the evening Dance United are in between 3:30 and 8pm and Byron Boxing Club run youth sessions from 6:15pm followed by adult sessions at 7:15pm.

North East Scotland Credit Union are in the centre on a Thursday morning between 9 and 10am.
Citizens Advice are also available between 10am and 3pm.
Aberdeen in Recovery run their Cuppa with a Purpose sessions between 1:30 and 3pm.

The under twelves group meets between 5:30 and 7pm, followed by the craft sew and sews who meet in the art room between 7:30 and 9pm. Clubercise runs between 7 and 8pm and hip hop got all sessions run between 7:30 and 9pm.

On a Friday afternoon Pathways offer a counselling service between 12:30 and 3pm and the pulmonary group are in the hall between 1:30 and 3:30pm. There is an indoor bowls group between 2 and 4pm. The BIG move

In our last edition we updated you on the shmu extension and our move to the former Rosehill Day Centre. Work to extend the existing shmuHQ building is well underway and staff and volunteers are all settled in at our temporary home.

The preferred contractors, CHAP, started work on the development in August this year and have made great headway as you can see from this photo. We have secured a significant amount of funding to pay for the fabric of the building, but we are currently working hard on a fundraising strategy to ensure we have enough money to pay for the equipment to turn it from a fantastic building to a state of the art community media centre.

Our aim is to enhance the facilities we already have so we will install two new radio studios and we will have a big communal social area, similar to what we had in the old building but we're also going to have an IT training room and a TV studio with a control room. We want to use the expansion of the building to expand our existing programmes to reach new people in our target areas.

Murray Dawson, Chief Executive of shmu said: "We identified a need for this state of the art

facility in our 2012-2017 strategic plan as we have been short of space for several years. Our new space in Rosehill Day Centre is much bigger than shmu so we're able to trial some of the new programmes we would like to run and use it as an opportunity to grow into the new space before moving back to Woodside."

We are aiming to be back in our Woodside building by August next year where we will then look at phase two of the redevelopment. Our aim for the existing building is to make it into a multipurpose space which can be used for cultural events in the evening, for example a small cinema or theatre and for workshops or teaching during the day.

Murray added: "The building was a core part of our strategic plan and it will allow us to develop other aspects of that plan. We want to do more of what we already do, we don't always need to be expanding and increasing in size but with the work we are currently doing in Aberdeenshire we need to look at what that means for us as an organisation. We need to have a clear sustainable financial plan for this and make sure that we don't take our eye off the ball with the key core work that happens in the regeneration areas of the city."



Watchman Brae and the Ghost Armies of Brimmond

Up on the East slope of Brimmond Hill facing the sea there was in years past, a look out post for warning the city of attack by sea, from this vantage point a lovely view of the horizon could be seen.

Many times, over many years there was fear of invasion from forces seeking to land on our coast from the Spanish, to Napoleon. The hillside served as a lookout that could signal Castle Hill in the city by having a permanent signal fire manned and ready, a small cottage gave shelter to the Watchman who

could raise the alarm by signal fire.

This early observer would surely have had a motto of "Forewarned is Forearmed" (as the real Observer Corps did) but no such invasions occurred on our coast and no intruding armies came ashore. However, there was in parish records in the 17th century sightings of Ghost Armies that appeared through the swirling mists upon the hill, fully equipped with the weapons of the day. On other occasions the sound of drums and trumpeting could be heard but not seen.

The Old Parish was not alone in these paranormal events, out at Echt on the Barmekin Hill similar events were recorded as were others across Europe.

Fear or reality, it is not known, but the records clearly show that through the mists and hill top cloud there marched Ghost Armies discharging rounds of cannon booming, and cavalry came riding through the fog their banners fluttered large and looming.

The Robbers' Cave, Old Newhills Parish

Hidden deep in the trees on the lower slopes of Elrick Hill off the walking trails and barely seen today, the infamous Robbers' Cave lies amongst fern and brambles. It was, once the haunt of criminals and vermin and thought by the vulgar (that is, the common people) to penetrate for miles underground where a notorious robber and his gang hid out to emerge on to the Kings Highway to rob and steal from the innocent traveller.

Notes of these horrid works were recorded in the Statistical Account of 1793 however all is not as it seems. The cave was in fact an old iron mine where deposits of the ore were hewn. Rumours and speculation and the fact that it was really the den of foxes which would leave locals with less "quack", "squawk", and "honk" to live on led the Council to order some barrels of powder and blew it up, and so the legend was destroyed, but not forgotten.

Are those shadows of a late evening up on Elrick Hill just the fading light, or are the dark horsemen still riding out into the night, to rob, steal, and plunder? Travellers beware!
