Northfield Academy Northern Lights

The Northern Lights Programme aims to encourage S1 and S2 pupils to think about the future and consider university as a possibility. Now in its second year, we have twenty three S2 pupils and twenty six S1 pupils participating in a number of workshops throughout the year discussing skills and gualities they have and having taster sessions in a number of faculties at Robert Gordon University (RGU). Long Lost, Long Acre, and the creation of Marischal College

Long Acre existed for about a century as an old part of the town, it is now buried under the magnificent façade of Marischal College, 1906, and its car parks. Within the confines of the original college was the College Kirk, a stand-alone chapel dedicated to the Virgin Mary and was part of the old Friary of the Franciscan order of Grey Friars, founded in around 1469 until the reformation in the 1560s. It was known as Saint Mary's Observantine Friary and was presented to the Town Council to protect it from the ravages of the desecraters of Chapels, Cathedrals, and Churches who were pillaging and destroying all things Catholic - Saints statues, crosses, and stained glass windows.

Eventually the Keith's, the Earls Marischal gained the property and transformed it into a Protestant College, in the Reformation period. It was the latter phase of construction in the last years of the 19th Century that saw the clearing of what was part of Long Acre and the creation of the front of Marischal. The name marischal means Horse Servant or Royal Keeper of Horse, it was a Military Title.

Long Acre had the first Children's Hospital in the City in 1877 until 1924 it transferred to Castle Terrace that in turn later became the site of Cocky Hunters' warehouse, and then on to Cornhill Road.

There were churches in Long Acre and a Methodist Mission for the poor on the now far side of Marischal, as well as the houses and shops with shoe makers and grocers, but the area deteriorated into slums in the Modern Era. A new Grey Friars stands in the form of the John Knox Grey Friars Church, now vacant, and a portion of the Window of the Old College Kirk, was built in.

During the renovation of Marischal and the examination of the Old Kirk foundations, objects were found in the form of coins in a bag and some early pots, However, the remains of seven older males were exhumed from the base level of the old kirk in 2009, as well as this there has been roof and floor tiles, stained glass and wall foundations.

Finally did you know that Adolf Hitler chose Marischal College as an HQ if he was successful in his invasion of Britain.

Maybe the Old Friars would have given him a hard time in the middle of the night.



Roots of Empathy is an evidence-based classroom programme proven in reducing levels of aggression within school children while increasing social and emotional competence and developing empathy.

What is Roots of Empathy?

A classroom based programme involving a parent and baby, where baby is the teacher! Each family visits the school nine times over the school year. The children observe the loving parent-child relationship, and grow to understand the baby's intentions and emotions. All of these visits are preceded and followed by a session designed to prepare the children and reinforce learning. A trained Roots of Empathy instructor leads activities designed to help pupils to identify and understand their own feelings and the feelings of others, what makes them unique and how to care for the baby safely.

Roots of Empathy have been running now for 5 years in Aberdeen in the Northfield area. Aberdeen City Council and Action for Children staff work in partnership in delivering the programme.

The Primary Schools that have taken part are: Manor Park, Heathryburn, Westpark, Holy Family, Bramble Brea, Quarryhill and Muirfield.

Shawn and his mum, Gail were the very first roots of empathy

mum and baby to get involved in the programme in Westpark School in 2012. On Thursday the 28th of April 2016 Shawn and his mum Gail came back to visit the school. It was very good to see Shawn. He was a little bit shy to begin with but he soon came round and answered some questions from the children. Shawn, will be going into P1 after the summer holidays, and the P7 class will be going into first year at Northfield Academy.

Gail, Shawn's mum said: "Shawn and I enjoyed taking part in Roots of Empathy it was very good to see the interaction between the children and Shawn. It was very good to return to Westpark to see the class grown up and ready for Academy."

Roots of Empathy will be starting back up in the new school year so we will be looking for mums and babies. The babies need to be 2 to 4 months old.

"Good afternoon ladies and gentlemen, I am here today to talk about Granitehill House Tenant's Association. We were proud to accept the award for Best Tenant's Association in Scotland in November at St Andrews. We are in to our fifth year and I would like to thank my committee, Mrs Sheila Rollo (vice-chair), Mrs Blanche Flaxman (secretary), Mrs Catherine Rose (treasurer) for the work they have done over the last four years. Our success is also down to the help we get from our members at various events, our senior housing officer, Sandra Wood and Kris McCombie and other housing assistants who have been very supportive over the years since we began our association.

Northfield – Part of the Biggest Regeneration of Aberdeen ever.

Well folks at long last we are beginning to see action taking place to regenerate the area.

A lot of people have asked what is going on at the Henry Rae Community centre. On 29th March I was proud to officiate at the sod cutting ceremony with youngsters from Manor Park Primary, Middlefield Community Project Nursery along with others from the Community who helped to launch the official start of work on the new £2.66million Community Hub. The new building will help the centre be even more of a hub for the community as the new facilities will make such a difference to groups who use it. The target is to be open at the end of the year. This will ensure projects which need to be relocated because of the new road can continue to operate. The new holes at Auchmill Golf Course and by the time you read this we should have entered into a 30-year lease. This coupled with the new 3G pitch, the School of Excellence

and the Museum Collection Centre shows that the Council is working hard to regenerate Northfield as part of its commitment to 'Shaping Aberdeen' as a city for people to live and work in into the future.

I trust people are satisfied with the work that is being undertaken to improve the lives of residents in Northfield and Aberdeen.

A resident contacted me last year with idea that he had. He asked if it would be possible to start an off lead area for dogs, somewhere that could be fenced, where dogs were able to run about, interact with other dogs and owners. I thought this was a brilliant idea as I could see the benefit not only for dogs and their owners but for the rest of the community too.

I contacted Cllr Cameron, one of the councillors that covers the ward next to mine to see if it was something that he thought he could support, which he did, as it could possibly scan both wards. Since then we have been working together with officers of the council, the resident and have also had the support of both Northfield and Mastrick community councils. It is still in the very early stages but the feedback so far has been positive. Hopefully soon we will have an area in our community that will have a positive impact in not only the dogs and their owners but the wider community.

As you are aware the new centre for excellence is currently underway just off Davidson Drive. This has meant that there has been more traffic on Springhill Road and the surrounding roads. This is unavoidable, and will continue until the build is completed. Residents have been in touch regarding the mess of mud on Springhill Road and the speed that lorries are going. I have been in touch with Aberdeen City Council and they have promised to keep the road as mud free as possible and have ensured that road sweepers are sweeping Springhill Road as much as possible. I have also been in touch with Police Scotland, who are aware of the issues of speeding and are keeping a very close watch on it.

Cumings Park Centre Garden Project

There is a large patch of land behind Cummings Park Centre that has been left unused for the last 15 years. The centre reopened last August after an 18-month closure and the team thought that putting this land to use for the local community was a great idea. They wanted benches, tables and plots for the community and local schools, a sensory garden and an outdoor learning area. There is not a huge amount of greenspace in the Northfield and Cummings Park areas so this will be a great resource for people who want to grow healthy foods and improve their diet as well as getting some fresh air.

The project has the potential to give the community a sense of ownership and pride in the area they live in. It also gives groups of people the opportunity to give something back to their area, through the court system and by volunteering in their community. The benefits of these kinds of activities have been well researched.

The space would also be a learning space as the wildlife area would be retained and could be used for classroom environmental learning within an urban setting.

Bramble Brae Primary, Northfield Academy, Cummings Park Centre Job Club, Inspire, and groups running in the centre all have an interest in getting the project going so far. A corporate group visited the centre at the end of June to start laying out the area and turning the drawings into a reality.

Million pound makeover for shmu!

Aberdeen City Council will work in partnership with Station House Media Unit [SHMU] to extend the existing community media hub in Woodside after members of the Finance, Policy and Resources Committee gave their seal of approval.

The facility at Station Road will undergo a makeover to the tune of £1m following a successful bid to the Scottish Government Regeneration Capital Grant Fund (RCGF). The project will turn Station House into a cutting edge, internationally acclaimed centre for community media, enabling shmu to play a key role in the cultural development of the region; gain further recognition as a hub for employability and criminal justice programmes; as well as deliver a unique approach in community development and youth work across a range of communities.

The purpose-built accommodation will be adjoining the existing Station House Media Unit building and will lead to at least a 100% increase in usable activity space.

It is anticipated the extended building will feature fit for purpose radio studios to accommodate the

organisations FM community radio station, a TV studio for live broadcasting, a music recording studio, digital editing facility and a digital learning centre.

Amenities such as additional office space, a new multi-purpose community/social space including a small scale performance area offering work experience will also form part of the extension plans.

Welcoming the news of the grant award shmu Chief Executive Murray Dawson said: "We are absolutely delighted with this grant award. Our five-year strategic plan, developed three years ago, set an aspiration to operate out of state of the art, fit for purpose facilities. This grant award will turn that vision into reality and will provide a fantastic boost to all of our volunteers, service users and staff.

We have delivered exceptional programmes and services for more than 15 years from a relatively poor facility base. The prospect of operating from a building designed specifically for our programmes, in conjunction with our stakeholders, is a really exciting proposition."

NESCU

The North East Scotland Credit Union Head Office has moved to 24 Victoria Road, Torry (the Old Bank of Scotland on the Victoria Bridge). We offer the same saving and loan opportunities as before in our shiny new premises.

SH: "Says that without the Credit Union I would not have had carpets and a cooker in my first flat. I had been homeless and had nothing, but for a couple of quid a week I was able to move into my flat with the things that I needed. Pathways have been actively working in Cummings Park helping people to find work for a number of years now and our Employability Keyworker, Theresa Mackay, meets with people looking for help at Cummings Park Community Flat, 122 Cummings Park Drive on Mondays and Tuesdays from 1.00 - 2.00pm.

Theresa has helped many people to find work across a number of industries and types of jobs. One of Theresa's clients came to see her for assistance after leaving college with no real job goals or an idea of how to proceed. Theresa reworked his CV, helped with online job applications and coached him through interview techniques and questions. Theresa also provided confidence building exercises to help build his confidence and motivation. He applied for a job at a local supermarket and did so well at the interview he was offered a position in retail which he continues to enjoy today.

Pathways help people from the age of 16 upwards and from all backgrounds and help to identify the job or training that is right for you. We also you to develop a plan to reach your job goal, help with CVs, assist in completing application forms and we also have access to funds to remove barriers to work. Last year the team of five Employability Keyworkers covering the city of Aberdeen helped 524 people into work and since the beginning of April another 26 clients have gone into employment.
