Northfield Youth Action Group team up with SHMU to produce a community safety film.



Next year, the Aberdeen Art Gallery and Museum will close for renovations, and their art and museum objects will move to a new, purpose-built storage facility in the Northfield that will care for the city's amazing collection. It won't, however, be a traditional 'gallery' that anyone can enter. There will be opportunities to explore the collection via a free booking system and it is planned that there will also be some displays in the public entrance, as well as free education projects. It is hoped that the new building will contribute to the ongoing regeneration of Northfield.

My project is a temporary one that tries to explore how the city's art collection could be made more public. As an artist,

however, I don't make paintings or sculptures. Instead, I arrange events in which the public can participate, for example games, community days, meetings, etc. The idea for this project was to design events inspired by objects within the collection - for example, a contemporary tennis match inspired by "The Tennis Party" painted by John Lavery in 1885. I had hoped to use objects from the past so we can make the future better.

Originally, I planned to work across Aberdeen, but the more I explored the project, the more sense it made for me to be focused entirely in Northfield, as this will be the area that will benefit from this new construction.

As such, I have taken two approaches; one developing projects with the community, and one designing events with the Art Gallery itself. With the Art Gallery, I want to explore their assumptions that art can be a catalyst for community regeneration, and ensure they approach your community ethically. With them, I've developed away-days, discussions and site visits to ensure they offer the people of Northfield what the people of Northfield need and want. The good news is they are responding rather well.


Our head teacher and Aberdeen football club supporter Mr Hendry even went as far as getting the Scottish League Cup to the school for everyone to take photos with.

Bramble Brae Primary School at Aberdeen Youth Games

Yes or no?

On September the 18th 2014 Scottish citizens will be asked to decide whether or not Scotland should be an independent country. We caught up with representatives from Better Together and Yes Aberdeen to find out why they are supporting each campaign. Don't forget to register to vote before the 2nd of September by visiting www.aboutmyvote.co.uk.



In your view, what will happen to pensions?

The UK Pensions Service has confirmed "if Scotland does become Independent, there will be no effect on State Pension - you'll continue to receive it just as you do now."

What will happen to our passports?

The Scottish Government confirms you can continue to use existing passports after independence until it expires. Dual nationality will also be offered along with new Scottish passports.

How would independence impact on our EU membership?

Professor Charlie Jeffrey of the University of Edinburgh has said, the prospect of Scotland's uninterrupted membership of the European Union is supported by "almost all independent expert analysis".

Will we keep the pound?

Scotland can't be stopped from using the pound but the Scottish Government will negotiate a formal currency union with agreements on financial regulation and oversight.

What happens to Scotland's share of the national debt?

The UK Treasury accepts responsibility for UK debt.

The Scottish Government will negotiate a fair and reasonable share of that debt, alongside a share of UK assets.

What would happen to the NHS in an independent Scotland?

Because we've been able to make our own decisions about the NHS, we've been able to protect against privatisation down south. This shows that making decisions ourselves works!

How would independence impact on the country's defence?

Scotland pays £3bn into the defence pot and only receives £2bn back. We would invest better and move away from Trident and illegal wars.

What kind of policy would an independent Scotland have on immigration?

After independence, decisions about immigration will be made by the Scottish Government and Parliament in the interests of Scotland's people, creating jobs and growing the economy.

If Scotland vote no would there be more devolved powers to the Scottish Parliament?

A no vote won't deliver significant powers to improve lives.
Suggested new powers are minimal and not the powers that we need. like taxation and welfare.

What would independence mean for education?

This sector shows how making our own decisions works - rejecting Tory reforms and reintroducing free access to education. Full powers will ensure that we protect cuts on services.

Better together?

In your view, what will happen to pensions?

With a faster ageing population here in Scotland, the best way of ensuring Scotland's pensioners are supported is to pool resources across the entire UK.

What will happen to our passports?

British citizens living outside the UK can pass their nationality on to their children, but not to subsequent generations.

Therefore, grandchildren of British citizens living in Scotland would not have British citizenship.

How would independence impact on our EU membership?

Scotland would have to re-apply to the EU. Our membership isn't guaranteed and the terms we get from the EU would not be as favourable.

Will we keep the pound?

Leaving the UK means leaving the UK Pound. Because it isn't in Scotland's interests, the main UK parties have ruled out a Eurozonestyle currency union.

What happens to Scotland's share of the national debt?

The debt Scotland takes on is subject to negotiation with the UK

government post-separation. The SNP's threat to renege on this debt is hugely irresponsible.

What would happen to the NHS in an independent Scotland?

The NHS is safer in the UK. Independent experts have s hown big cuts in public services or tax rises would be needed if we separate.

How would independence impact on the country's defence?

Every penny of the UK's £34 billion defence budget benefits Scots. This is more than 14 times the SNP's proposed budget if we separate.

What kind of policy would an independent Scotland have onimmigration?

That is for the party in power to decide. Impartial experts say that 1 million immigrants would be needed to balance the books if separate.

If Scotland vote no would there be more devolved powers to the Scottish Parliament?

Yes it's guaranteed. More powers are already being delivered through the 2012 Scotland Act

and all of the pro-UK parties have promised additional further powers.

What would independence mean for education?

Education is a devolved matter but Scotland's universities face losing vital research funding which they benefit disproportionately from as part of the UK.

The Curious Case of the Bog People

Across Europe a number of preserved bodies have been unearthed after being submerged in what was once a peat bog or marsh. These bodies are naturally tanned by the acidity of the peat. This emersion was thought to be a practice lasting thousands of years and a means of punishing criminals, but new research has concluded that these bodies were quite often the result of human sacrifices. Researchers came to this conclusion due to the careful grooming which also matched folk lore, for example the filing of nails and the trimming of beards. In many cases the body was found to have had a series of wounds and a cord has been used to strangle the victim after a severe blow to the head. The

throat was ritually cut, in some cases decapitation occurred. These bodies are not all male and can go back thousands of years. through the middle Stone Age, to the Iron Age and beyond. It is thought that these were offerings that were made at a time of famine and, because the bodies in some cases have been very well preserved, the content of the stomach can be examined. This normally contains a mix of grains and pulses. These bodies are named after the locations where they were found, for example Tollund Man and Koelbjerg Woman and the famous Lindow man, to name a few.

It is now thought by some that these persons went willingly to carry a message to the Gods. Votive offerings were very common in Celtic Europe, and like the bodies most were placed in water. Broken swords, pins and other metal objects would be cast into pools to honour the Spirits or Divas. This tradition became the origin of wishing wells, and it is in pools that the bodies would have been placed. Many bodies were weighed down by stones and some were pinned down with stakes.

This is a very curious piece of our wider European History, including Germany, Denmark, Ireland, England, and Holland. Who knows maybe one day in a local bog such as the Bucks Moss, or out on Scotstown Moor a leathery hand will rise from the myre.

The Cummings Park Community Flat has been very busy. We have been offering Adult Learning Classes such as cooking, literacy and computing which are small and not intimidating. People have had the opportunity to attend activity classes such as knitting, sewing, art or craft and even a 'Happiness in Practice' class.

We continue to offer one off sessions or short workshops. These have included men's

health, women's health, general health and awareness groups focusing on drugs, alcohol and a legal high information session.

We have had a singing group, a relaxation group and an opportunity for people to gain a first aid and food and hygiene qualification.

As a Community Flat we like to be involved in all aspects that help to raise the profile of our area. Bramble Brae Primary School, Northfield Academy, Aberdeen City Council, Housing and the NHS supported us in our second litter pick session which 57 people attended.

Healthy Hoose News

Our patient numbers have steadily increased over the past 2 years since we expanded our service to the Cummings Park area. We welcome all new patients from the Middlefield and Cummings Park areas.

At present we are short staffed due to long term sickness. There will be times when only one nurse is working which may increase your waiting time a little. We are trying hard to maintain the service we provide but, there may be occasions when there is no nurse available. This is usually due to training that we must complete.

Contraception update - Health services are encouraging the use of long-term contraception, i.e. implant, coil or depo injection, as a good option for young women. All of the nurses are trained to give advice on all types of contraception. At present we do not fit coils but, this may change in the near future.

If you are a Northfield Surgery patient aged 35-64 years old you may be entitled to a Keep Well Check. If you have had a letter and live in Middlefield or Cummings Park we can do the heck here.

Head lice advice -

- Please do not treat if there are no live head lice.
- Check all family members regularly (not just children).
 Always repeat treatment after 7 days.
- Regular combing with conditioner to remove nits and detect lice.

Not all people with head lice will have an itchy scalp; it can take some time for the itch to start. You can contact us on 01224 661500 or drop in to 2B Logie Place.

CREATIVE COMPOSITIONS

Station House Media Unit (shmu) will launch a cross-cultural music and film project this summer with the Aberdeen Multicultural Centre and Aberdeen's Ethnic Minority Forum. Collective Compositions, which will be the first of its kind in Aberdeen, was funded by Creative Scotland and will bring together musicians from a diverse range of minority ethnic backgrounds to record and perform a range of unique pieces of music. shmuSOUND supports the local music scene and focuses on supporting artists and bands to record, promote and broadcast new music.

The project will be filmed by a team of volunteers and turned into a 'making of' documentary which will be premiered later this year. Collective Compositions aims to raise of the profile of the city's minority ethnic musicians while creating a space where people from different cultures can learn through music.

Simon Gall, shmuSOUND Development Worker said: "It's important that cultural organisations in the city start to properly reflect the changes which have taken place over the last 10 to 15 years in the demography of Aberdeen. This is a valuable project which represents and celebrates the true cultural landscape of the city."

Work has begun on the two new holes at Auchmill Golf Course following an agreement with Aberdeen City Council to provide further funding. The request to have a 35 year lease has also been agreed so this should help raise funds through sponsorship.

Six members of Auchmill Golf Club including myself have gained coaching certificates and we are currently coaching junior members and pupils at Northfield Academy. If anyone has kids which would like to take up golf then please contact the club on 714215.

In the last edition I said that I was trying to get a bus shelter installed on Granitehill Road. This was because the road created a wind tunnel at times and that a lot of the older folk use the bus stop to get into town.

The response that I have received so far is that there appears to be no technical reason that bus shelters could not be installed on Granitehill Road. Currently there is no budget allocation for the installation of new bus

shelters, however, as bus routes change and bus shelters are no longer needed they are recycled to areas that are in need. I have been assured that the request has been added to the pre-existing waiting list and that the council will also undertake some surveys to ascertain the level of use of this bus stop. Given the location and proximity to sheltered housing they think the request seems sensible.

On another note, I have been working closely with a newly formed group called "Friends of Howes." They are trying to get the

area of Howes/Bucksburn Valley cleaned up so that folk can enjoy the various walks along there. I must admit, I have lived in the area for over 28 years and did not realise that there were pathways that led down into Bucksburn and that we had a lovely pond with amazing wildlife just waiting to be discovered.

They are planning a clean-up day soon, so please keep a look out for more information and hopefully you will be able to come along and help on the day.
