

DA - Alcohol Services

Serving the Northfield Community

Every community face issues related to alcohol use. Whether it is our own alcohol use or that of someone else we care about. We appreciate that the use of alcohol can be used for a variety of reasons such as socialising, having fun and relaxing. However some people may feel that they would like to reduce their drinking or even stop completely due to a variety of reasons.

We work with people to provide relevant, accurate and honest information enabling them to make informed decisions with regards to their alcohol use. We also recognise that people need different levels of support at different times and we work across the spectrum with people on preventing harmful drinking, reducing problematic drinking and helping people to work towards and maintain recovery, including abstinence if appropriate.

It can also be a worrying time for friends or family members who are affected or concerned by someone else's alcohol use. Whatever issues people are facing with regards to their own drinking or that of someone else we can provide an immediate and confidential service for people to

discuss any concerns they may have.

If you would like to talk about your alcohol use or that of some one else's we have trained substance use workers in the Northfield community. DA is in Northfield Community Centre every Wednesday afternoon from 2.30pm-4.30pm please feel free to drop-in. Off to a good start

SPPA Play Practitioner Susan Emery, describes what happens at the Off to a Good Start Stay & Play and Baby Massage sessions that she organises, and explains how they have helped one of the families who attend.

The Big Lottery funded free Stay and Play sessions are aimed at families with children from birth to three years, although older pre-school children are welcome to attend too. I currently lead a variety of play and baby massage sessions across Aberdeen in the Mastrick, Northfield, Tillydrone and Middlefield areas.

The aim of the sessions is to encourage parents and carers who attend with their child to use the session as an opportunity to meet other parents or carers and to have fun and play with their child. At each session I provide a

messy activity or craft activity, as well as making other resources available such as puzzles, a train set, dolls, or vehicles for example. The families have a small snack which is usually fruit and a savoury nibble and then enjoy story time and song time. I provide them with ideas for activities that they can try out at home, that don't cost a fortune!

Good working relationships with families and other professionals have been established and it is gratifying to see the impact the sessions are having on the families who attend. One parent who attends with her 2 year old has said she sees a huge difference in her son's confidence and willingness to mix as well as feeling more confident herself — even her partner has noticed saying that she has "come out of her box."



The baby massage sessions at Northfield Community Centre are half way through the block now and parents have found that the massage can help with colic and teething as well as being a nice, relaxing thing to do with their baby.

The Northfield Award Group

he young people in The Northfield Award Group took part in The Close project as a first time ballet experience for young people. Last year they took part in "The Highland Fling" at HMT but the workshops were the same layout. They thoroughly enjoyed it last year and were keen to sign up again when the opportunity arose this year.

From these projects over 2 years the young people also managed to express their personal and emotional needs by working with others and gaining confidence to produce a short piece that was captured on video. This was a very different form of expressive art for the young people to enjoy. We were also invited down to The Scottish Ballet's headquarters at The Tramway in Glasgow where we produced a dance/movement piece, went on a tour round the headquarters and luckily were allowed to sit in on a rehearsal. Both years we met some of the cast, danced with some at the workshops and met some

performers after the show for a chat and Q&A session.

Our young people have also taken part in a 6 week "Come into my parlour" arts project working with the Creative Arts Team learning "old songs your granny used to sing," knitting and old wives tales. From this the young people were caught on video singing the "old songs" and having discussions around tales learning about the past, Scottish heritage and traditions. After the project, which ran throughout the city, there was a big presentation of all the excellent pieces of work that had been produced, held at Rosemount Community Centre. From this event our young people met residents from Granitehill House and Hamewith Lodge, sheltered housing in the Northfield area and we discussed doing some intergenerational work with them. We were invited to Granitehill House where we met more of the residents and discussed working together trying to see what we

could work on around heritage, culture and creativity.

We also have permission to decorate/paint the room we currently meet in at Northfield Community Centre and will look at producing a mural of the area past and

present that others from the centre can contribute towards.

The young people have benefited from dance and music and have more awareness of being creative. They are more confident and knowledgeable in what culture and heritage from their past is all about. They have produced excellent pieces of work which have been caught on camera and film.

The young people will also collate all the evidence from all these events, keeping registers, pictures and letters etc so they will achieve a Dynamic Youth Award or a Youth Achievement Award.

The young people involved would probably never contemplate taking part in projects like this if they didn't have their youth group to go to. Also being able to visit the theatre and be involved in a project as big as this is something that has benefited them greatly by allowing them to take part in new activities, meet new people, visit places out with Aberdeen and learn new skills. The group have also overcome personal hurdles to achieve some of these and we are proud of them all.

The group won the award for "Aberdeen, City of Culture" and Sara Duncan and Ingrid Taylor who work with this group won the Community Learning Award.

A new building to house the collections of Aberdeen Art Gallery and Museums will be constructed on the gap site adjacent to Granitehill Road. We need a store for the works of art and objects that are not on display in the Art Gallery and Maritime Museum. The new store will be purpose built and will contain racking and shelving to hold all the items that have been collected over the course of many years. The environment inside the centre will be controlled so that it

helps to preserve the collections for the future.

The contractor for the construction of the building is about to be appointed and work should begin this year. Once the building is completed and we have moved in, we plan that to open it to the public at certain times, so that people can come and see what sort of items we collect and how they relate to the history of Aberdeen, Scotland and other countries.

Regeneration Matters

Regeneration Matters is a constituted group of community representatives from all the regeneration areas in Aberdeen City.

They meet every month (apart from July and December) in a central venue. The group are eager to invite new members to join them. Their themed meetings have covered a number of topics over the year including welfare reform, the impact of regeneration in communities, housing issues, and alcohol and drug abuse. The group have the opportunity to share information about their communities and awareness of any relevant issues. The group have visited other regeneration

areas in Scotland and undertake

an annual review to decide on the issues they will cover the following year. Members of the group are elected as community representatives onto the Fairer Aberdeen Board. The group also co-manages the Community Support Fund.

Dear fellow gardeners,

Spring is in the air but not in my heart as I look out from the warmth of the kitchen to a somewhat soggy and un-kept back garden. However, I reluctantly discard the warmth and comfort of my slippers for my gardening boots and make my way to the green house. On entering I can almost hear the greenhouse say "where have you been, you great lazy lump?"

My first task was getting my onion sets into small pots with fresh compost to encourage them to root. The containers of daffodils and tulips are growing well, waiting patiently to be displayed in the racks outside. A quick rake up of the compost and a good watering has them pruning themselves for a grand spring flower show. I have decided to grass over some of my veggie

plot and create a flower border with plants to attract bees and butterflies to add a bit of interest to the area. There is a small holly bush I intend to use as my centre piece within my green oasis where I shall relax and listen to the scent of the bees and the hum of the flowers – they don't call me a neep for nothing.

Councillors Comments

Scott Carle

After the recent upgrades to Allan Douglas Park this year where the existing equipment was renewed by the council, I am delighted to announce that another local park is due to have work done to improve the facilities on offer.

Work is due to start on Eric Hendrie Park on Springhill Road to improve the facilities on offer as well as improve access to the park after Aberdeen Greenspace received a grant of £45,000 from Nexen to make improvements.

The work which will total £70,000 includes a new multi play area similar to the one at Allan Douglas Park with football and basketball equipment as well as improvements to the surrounding

greenspace and the upgrade of the paths which provide access to the park.

After the success of the work at Allan Douglas Park, I'm sure these new and improved facilities will be a welcome addition to the community and Gordon and I look forward to seeing the park once the work is completed.

As we approach the half way stage of our term in office I would also like to bring to your attention what both Scott Carle and I with the assistance of our Finance Convenor Willie Young have undertaken to bring much needed improvements to Northfield and Cummings Park. These are:

- 50k modernisation for Alan Douglas Park.
- £350k to develop Auchmill Golf Course (to allow a road to be built that will connect Provost Rust Drive and Provost Fraser Drive and housing development on the Bucksburn Farm site).
- Auchmill Golf Club received £5k to assist in the purchase of 4 golf buggies.
- £2k to allow access to leisure payments at Auchmill Golf Course.

- £7m to provide a school for the disabled opposite Davidson Drive.
- £2-3m to provide an arts storage facility at Granitehill Road on land that has lain empty for years.
- £20k has been allocated to improve the children's play park next to Heathryfold Circle and council officers are trying to identify further funding streams. There is an open meeting being held to progress. Contact Madele for information on 01224 812074.
- A larger project is being planned for the Eric Henry Park which will include an all-weather pitch.
- Willie and I are currently working with Byron Sports Club and Aberdeen Amateur Boxing Club to identify facilities in the Northfield area.

- Providing housing for those affected by the Haudagain modifications.
- We are currently seeking funding of £2m to provide facilities for Middlefied Community Project either attached to or close to the Henry Rae Community Centre.
- Another major announcement will be made soon which will be of huge benefit to Northfield and surrounding areas.

Relocation of the Middlefield Community Project will bring with it not only job opportunities but also nursery and play scheme opportunities for families in both Northfield and Cummings Park.
