has some stunning views.



# Smoking Advice Service

The Smoking Advice Service is Grampian's local stop smoking service and offers free support to anyone who wishes to quit. Young or old you can get access to a tailored level of support that means you are four times more likely to stop than someone who decides to try and stop on their own. Sessions are held across Grampian and run by one of our trained advisors who can see you in a group, or on your own and even over the telephone. Sessions generally run once a week for six weeks with an additional six weeks of support offered at the end of that for those who feel they need it. You can expect a friendly face, a professional service and the chance to meet other people like yourself and see that you don't have to go through this alone. The advisor will find the right way for you to stop smoking and give you advice on the many stop smoking medications available as well as a voucher for you to take to your GP so that you can be prescribed your chosen option.

There are a number of these medications currently available on prescription such as

Nicotine Replacement Therapy - patches, gum, inhalator, mouth spray, nasal spray, mouth strips, lozenge, micro tabs as well as Champix and Zyban.

If you feel that groups or that level of support is not for you then why not visit your local community pharmacy where you will receive stop smoking support as well as access to stop smoking medications on prescription. The pharmacy scheme is a drop in service so no appointment is required.

## Why should you stop smoking:

As well as the obvious health benefits think of the money you will save. Currently a packet of 20 cigarettes costs around £8, so quitting will give a 20-a-day smoker an extra £56 a week.

You'll also save money in other ways. Life, home and car insurance can all be cheaper when you're a non-smoker.



## ABERDEEN'S CHILDLINE OFFICE CELEBRATES 10TH BIRTHDAY

Esther Rantzen, founder of ChildLine, joined staff and volunteers in Aberdeen last month to celebrate 10 years of ChildLine in Aberdeen. During this time the Aberdeen office has handled more than 72,000 counselling sessions, with more than 3.2 million children nationwide benefitting from the service since it began in 1986.

The NSPCC's ChildLine service is currently looking for additional volunteers to join the team.

Aberdeen's Volunteer Co-ordinator Kerri Stewart says 'Increasing our volunteer team will enable us to reach even more children and will ensure that we continue to provide a life line for young people in distress'.

Thousands of children speak to a ChildLine in Scotland volunteer counsellor every year because they feel they have no else to turn to about their worries or concerns. Counsellors listen, assess and explore feelings and options with callers, who contact ChildLine by phone and online about a range of issues including bullying, abuse, neglect, sexuality and pregnancy.

Formal training or qualifications in counselling are not required, as full training is provided to all successful applicants. All that's needed is a commitment to children, an open mind and an ability to listen and support young people who need to talk.

## WAITANGI DAY DINNER AND DANCE

## NORTH-EAST SCOTLAND DISABLED VETERANS ASSOCIATION

On the 8th of February 2014, ten members of our association were deeply honored to be invited to attend the Waitangi day or, as it is more commonly known, the New Zealand Day dinner and dance in Perth, Scotland.

This function was arranged and organized by Mrs. Eretti Mitchell of the New Zealand Society Scotland to celebrate the day that the country came under the Governance of the British Government and Crown.

This was no mean feat in 1840. As you can understand that there was only horses or shanks' ponies at that time, so it took a long time to get around all the tribe villages. There was approximately 540 tribes between both of the main islands of New Zealand.

Of these 540 tribes (14 of which had a female chief) 530 signed or made their mark on the governance document which held up their Maori rights to the ownership of their land and properties, and to give the Maoris full rights of British subjects.

Well that was the history part, and now the function part...

The dinner and dance was held at The Murray Shall Hotel and Golf Club in Scone, Perthshire. To say this venue was isolated is an understatement as it was up the darkest single lane road that we have ever seen. I would not have liked to have a skin full and have to stagger down to the main road.

Otherwise the hotel was absolutely fantastic, both in the decor and the friendliness of their staff, and, best of all, they had an open log fire to warm your cockles by. The meal was three courses as follows.

1st course of duck pate with mini oatcakes.

2nd course of braised Scottish lamb with dauphin Oise potatoes and seasonal vegetables.

3rd course of banoffee cake with vanilla ice cream.

Doesn't that make your mouth water? Once the meal was finished the band struck up with a mixture of Scottish and modern music.

Not to be outdone, the Kiwi's, under the tutorage of Mrs. Eretti Mitchell, a Maori herself gave us a demonstration of traditional Maori dancing and singing which really took you to those far away islands. Eretti was dressed in Maori national dress which also added to the atmosphere of the night.

We were also taught some of the Maori language in the last song and some guests were taken up to the dance floor to participate in the last dance, and it looked very strange to see hairy Scotsmen and women, most of whom were in kilts, take part in this dance.

Now the dancing started in earnest, in which two of our senior members - Mr. Gordon Anderson and Mrs. Margaret Donald really enjoyed themselves. Now, whether it was due to the whiskies that were consumed or just their natural talent at dancing one will never know.

Once Gordon and Margaret were up the rest of our group started dancing with the other guests, whether they were Scottish or a New Zealander. It didn't matter a jot, both groups joined in together and a great evening was had by all.



But, the usual happened, we were just getting into the swing of things and we had to leave. Unfortunately we were not staying at Murray Shall Hotel and had to travel back to the Salutation Arms Hotel in Perth to go to bed.

The following morning after a lovely breakfast we had to wind our way back to the Granite City.

So as you can see folks we in the Association have a wide and varied social life, so if there are any veterans who would like to come along and perhaps participate in our wide and varied activities then come along to our meeting at Mastrick Community Centre any Monday or Friday between the hours of 11am and 2pm. We will make you feel very welcome.

Our campaign for a mini bus will see us taking possession of a brand new 17 seater within the first week of March 2014 which is just in time for us to take part in the ANZAC day parade in Arbroath. We have attended this event for the past six years and we recognise it as the start of another year of functions, parades and collections.

#### **Meeting Rooms**



## S1 Parents Consultation Week

This term we introduced the S1 Parent Consultation Week for the first time. This was a move away from the traditional model of an S1 parents' evening.

The Consultation Week was a week-long opportunity for parents to visit at a time of their choosing.

Appointments were offered at different times throughout the week with one member of staff providing feedback on pupil progress.

This was an excellent opportunity for parents to visit the school and have a quality conversation about their son/daughter's learning at Northfield Academy. Evaluations of the week are ongoing but initial feedback from both staff and parents has been very positive.

Last year the attendance at S1 parents' evenings averaged 53% and attendance at this year's Consultation Week was close to 90%. Thank you to everyone who supported this new initiative which has certainly helped us to increase parental involvement one of our key priorities.



January saw the first of seven visits by John Chalmers and Sandra Marrs of Graphic Novel writing/illustrating team Metaphrog. Our three year Patron of Reading partnership got off to a great start with all S1 pupils being introduced to the art of graphic novel planning and design. The informative and practical workshop took pupils on a journey of discovery through different types of graphic novels before allowing them to create strong, descriptive characters of their own. These workshops were very well received by pupils. Returning in February Metaphrog worked with Heathryburn and West Park Primaries at the Academy on a similar workshop theme.

Thirty S1 pupils then got the opportunity to work further on their previous character creation designing their own comic script with guidance from John and Sandra. Since the sessions, pupils have had the opportunity to finish their comics which will be displayed in school and on the Library blog next term.

We were pleased to receive a kind gift from them of a class set of "Louis: Red Letter Day" and accompanying lesson ideas. In between visits John and Sandra will be keeping in touch to recommend graphic novels to pupils. The partnership with Metaphrog is a three year one so we will be looking forward to planning further visits and activities with them in the near future.

## **Young Coach of the Year**

One of our S4 pupils, Hayley McMillan, was awarded the Sport Scotland Grampian Award for Young Coach of the Year 2013. To win this award, Hayley first won the local Sport Aberdeen Award for Young Coach of the year, which led her to be put on the short list for the Grampian Award. Her huge commitment, and her willingness to help out wherever and whenever she can, led her to winning this award. Hayley is our schools Platinum Young Ambassador, whose role is to encourage and inspire young people to participate in sport. Hayley gives up a lot of her free time to do this, and is very dedicated to trying to get young people in to sport. Hayley coaches the Schools Basketball Team, the Girls Football team, assists with the S2 Boys football team and also helps with Girls Club. Hayley is a very talented sports person herself and is a great role model throughout the school. She has motivated a lot of young people, especially girls, to get in to sport. Congratulations to Hayley for winning this award.







## **Culture Café**

This term we have launched our Culture Café venture which takes place every Tuesday lunchtime from 1pm. A dedicated group of our senior pupils have been responsible for setting up the venue, designing signs and décor, setting up and clearing up on a weekly basis, planning music and activities, performing live music, making food and drink to sell and serving, advertising, manning doors, and joining in with peers in the games and activities on offer; as well as undertaking "Bully Buster" training with Aberdeen City Community Learning Development team.
