Sustainable Food City Partnership Aberdeen Launch Event

The Sustainable Food City
Partnership Aberdeen (SFCPA)
launched on Friday 1st
September at an event which
gathered various people
across Aberdeen to discuss
how to progress this approach
going forward.

The partnership is chaired by Cllr Lesley Dunbar, who spoke at the event on both the successes of the partnership thus far, and the critical need for such a partnership in Aberdeen.

During the launch, partners were invited to sign their names to a Sustainable Food Charter, indicating actions that individuals and organisations could take to show their commitment to driving forward the Sustainable Food agenda in Aberdeen. This Food Charter will be available online, and the SFCPA plan to gain city-wide support via this pledge.

The group's first campaign is Sugar Smart Aberdeen. The campaign will recruit a wide variety of businesses and organisations, including local schools to make sugar smart pledges and support Aberdonians to lead healthier lives

Alcohol and Drugs Action - The Green Light Project

The Green Light Project is a service run by Alcohol and Drugs Action and is funded by Comic Relief. The service is for anyone up to the age of 25 who is deemed to be at risk of child sexual exploitation in the real world or online. Child sexual exploitation occurs when there is an imbalance of power within a relationship and the young person receives something in exchange for the abuse such as money or gifts. In turn, the offender will receive more than just sexual gratification from the abuse - they may also gain a heighten sense of status, power or monetary gain.

The project provides 1:1 support, group work and awareness training events across city and shire and has been running for over 8 months now. The GLP worker, Hannah Bennett, is new to Aberdeen and so has spent the past few months getting to know Aberdeen as a city, and getting to know the other agencies she will be working closely with (for example, the local Police and Barnardo's) to enable her to proactively provide this service to schools, community centres and

agencies working closely with young people.

The main work Hannah completes with the Green Light Project focuses on the risks of social media and how to stay safe online. She recently completed a 2 day market stall at Ellon Academy, raising awareness of the risks of apps like Snapchat and Instagram amongst Ellon Academy pupils and parents. She was also recently involved in a Facebook Live Chat Event with the North East Police service, talking to members of the public about how to keep children safe online.

Hannah works with a number of young people 1 to 1, and provides support and advice on issues surrounding sexual exploitation such as 'sexting', sexual health, romantic relationships and consent.

The Very Best of Northfield Awards were held in the Aberdeen Asset Management Suite at Pittodrie on Sunday the 25th of June to honour 24 inspiring people from the Northfield community. Over 100 people attended to help celebrate their achievements.

Northfield area were celebrated

at an event in June this year.

The event came about as a culmination of two community programmes delivered by Northfield Total Place – Northfield Champions and Northfield Local Heroes. Northfield Total Place was established to raise educational attainment, promote positive attachment and parenting, improve aspiration and achievement and improve health and wellbeing in the greater Northfield area. Northfield Total Place covers Northfield, Middlefield, Cummings Park, Mastrick and Heathryfold.

The Northfield Champion scheme was set up to showcase some of the success stories from the area, this involved Aberdeen City Council staff looking for folk who

had been educated in
Northfield who had moved
on to higher education,
employment or training. They
then had their picture taken and
their images were put together
as part of an aspirational poster
campaign and distributed the
neighbourhood.

Feedback from this scheme was mostly positive but a lot of local people thought it was also important to celebrate the people who were living in the community and working or volunteering to provide opportunities for people in the area. Thus, Local Heroes was born. Local people had to nominate those who either lived, worked or volunteered in the community and made a significant difference to the area by doing so. The nominees were then contacted and had their pictures taken and their stories shared on social media.

There were 17 Local Heroes recognised for the 2016/17 run and now the Northfield Communities Team are looking for more nominations.

- Aberdeen's Library Committee built both Northfield and Mastrick Libraries as part of a plan to extend the provision of libraries into new housing areas
- Before Northfield had a library unit the area was served by a mobile library. People often queued to
 use the service and over 9000 books were borrowed so it was decided to build a library within the
 community. It was due to the success of the library in Northfield that they decided to build one
 in Mastrick!
- From humble beginnings Mastrick Library has grown and now boasts the 125 Treasures Collection.
 This is an interactive exhibition available on the touchscreens in Mastrick Library and was put together to celebrate the 125th anniversary of Aberdeen City Libraries.
- The library service has moved with the times and you can do a lot more there than borrow books there's also free WiFi and PC access, a health information point and a toy library for the little ones!

As many of you will now be aware, I relocated my constituency office earlier this year and am now based at Mastrick Shopping Centre. I am certainly enjoying being fully immersed within the Mastrick community and want to make my office as welcoming and open as possible to all my constituents.

Therefore, I recently signed up for my office to become breastfeeding friendly and I am pleased to announce that it is now officially registered for the NHS Grampian Breastfeeding Welcome Scheme. The pilot project is being rolled out across the city, with the aim of raising the profile of breastfeeding and the Breastfeeding etc. (Scotland) Act and I am proud to add to the growing list of breastfeeding friendly premises.

Unfortunately, new mothers may sometimes feel stigmatised when breastfeeding in public, even though there is absolutely no need for them to feel that way. The Breastfeeding Act protects a mothers' right to breastfeed their child in public, and I would hope that registering for the scheme strengthens that message.

I am delighted that my constituency office has now signed up to the scheme, and hope this will help in our bid to tackle stigma and raise awareness of the Breastfeeding Act and its impact.

Mastrick Policing Team Update

During the summer months
Aberdeen tends to experience
a high level of annoyance from
those who use motorbikes
illegally. Not only is this antisocial
behaviour dangerous for the
rider, it also poses a risk to the
local community.

To tackle this problem a small team of Aberdeen Community Policing Team staff, supported by Aberdeen Community Safety Partnership, undertook Operation Trinity from May until August 2017.

During the summer months, the team removed 49 vehicles from circulation which would have been used to drive illegally throughout the city. In tackling the offenders linked to these vehicles, 33 people were charged with offences.

The team worked closely this year with Police Scotland Youth Volunteers who enthusiastically carried out leaflet drops in affected residential areas, seeking information regarding who was responsible in the local community for such antisocial

activity.

The team also worked with Aberdeen Motorbike Project (AMPED) and sought to refer young riders to this diversionary project where they would learn responsible biking.

As a result of the operation there has been a year on reduction in motorbike antisocial behaviour calls to the Police across the city by 66%.

To those involved in Operation Trinity this year I wish to pass on my sincere thanks and to the local communities affected I trust they will see that we are continuing to tackle this issue and reduce its impact across the city.

My final word goes to the Police Scotland Youth Volunteers who displayed that with a little enthusiasm, motivation and some guidance young people can achieve great things to assist their local communities. Looking Forward... It Involves You

Well, here we are, autumn has arrived, and it is a year since I moved to Mastrick to commence ministry at St Clement's Scottish Episcopal Church in Mastrick Drive.

My first few months were spent getting to know the congregation and the neighbourhood in Mastrick I am living in, and trying to find my way around Aberdeen city. The New Year heralded an opportunity to look forward as a congregation, to understand better what God's mission is for the congregation of St Clement's.

We decided to run a summer lunch club, and make use of the facilities our church has, for the benefit of our local community. I have also helped run a Bible Club at Muirfield Primary School, which has been great fun. Chatting to P1 – P3 children who voluntarily attend the club is so rewarding, their questions are very direct and I do my best to answer each one as best I can.

We continue to offer a short service of morning and evening Prayer each weekday, a good way to 'bookend' the day, and on a Sunday we continue with our 10:30 Holy Communion service, and a short 6.30pm service – details of all our services are on our Facebook page

(St Clements Episcopal Church, Aberdeen).

So, looking forward, what next? I am firm believer that mission is less about what our congregation may offer to the community and more about what the community identifies as needing done and then helping individuals in that community see what strengths and gifts they have to offer to help change things themselves. To this end, I am interested in finding out answers to the following three questions.

- 1. What is genuinely good about Mastrick, what works well here?
- 2. What do you think would make Mastrick even better?
- 3. What could you offer that would help make Mastrick better?

I shall be organising a community event, inviting people to join us for a conversation over tea and bacon rolls (veggie options will be available), to explore these three questions and to see what the community can itself do to improve the lives of all in our community. And it doesn't have to be big things. As an example, here is a story of an activity that started small. At a previous church three ladies of more mature years, who

were not very mobile, agreed to meet fortnightly, to knit clothes for premature babies, warm hats for seamen and also to knit shawls for people who were unwell (mainly people undergoing chemotherapy). The social interaction was valued by these three, and they also felt a strong sense of purpose in using a skill they had that could benefit someone else in their community. The knitting group grew, with several young mums joining who were feeling isolated at home caring for young children. Out of small beginnings a vibrant group developed that met the needs of those individuals but also gave something of value to others in their community.

So the challenge to you is to consider the three questions above, and think how you might respond. No matter how small, what could you offer that would make Mastrick better? So, please keep an eye out for a date of a meeting to discuss these questions, and be part of the change you wish to see in your community.

The BIG move

In our Spring edition, we announced the exciting news that the Station House Media Unit building in Woodside would undergo a million pound make-over following a successful application to the Scottish Government Regeneration Capital Fund. Work begins in late August on the new purpose-built accommodation, which will significantly extend our existing building. The new building will include new radio studios, a recording studio, TV studio, an IT suite, improved training facilities, an edit suite and some fantastic new social space. The building will also be the main office base for the organisation. During the estimated 12 month building period, staff and services will be based at Aberdeen City Council's Rosehill House Day Centre on Ashgrove Road West.

The relocation is due to take place during the week commencing 21st August with CHAP

Construction starting the building work on the 28th August. Although this is a time of upheaval, it is also a time of opportunity, with Rosehill House offering more space to develop our services and try out new work before returning to our new building. Staff will ensure that volunteers and service users are supported to continue their programmes in our temporary location, and look forward to sharing news of new and expanded projects and services in due course.

The organisation also continues to work on a fundraising plan to ensure the new building will meet all of our needs, and also for Phase 2 of the build, which will transform the existing building into a small community venue.

BUS INFO

Catch the number 3 bus from within Mastrick which will take you to Stocket Parade, just off North Anderson Drive. From there walk down NA Drive in the direction of ARI and at the traffic lights between NA Drive and Ashgrove Road West turn left and we're just there on the corner.





MASTRICK WALKING GROUPS

Loch Kinnord is an old favourite which is usually walked in June when the water lilies are at their best. If the sun is out the flowers open which is a lovely sight across the loch. There is a Pictish Cross and there was a crannog on an island that at one time was inhabited.

Lunch is at the Burn O' Vat Centre and we finish by walking round the other side of the loch.

Kinnaber is a walk just North of Montrose. It starts with a walk down a track with silver birch trees either side, then along past the Old WWII airfield where the fighters took off, along a path to the River North Esk which we follow to the beach. This looks over to St Cyrus Nature Reserve, another walk which we

do quite often. Lunch is nice sitting down on the beach (if it's fine), then back over the sand dunes then through a small wood. Back into the bus across the road to Charleton Fruit Farm for a coffee and a strawberry tart.

The walk at Glen Tanar starts by walking around the juniper trail first then down the Tanar Water to the Fairy Lochan which is a lovely place for lunch. We then have a wee bit of a climb to the view point to take in the views. Then it's back down the river passing the little Chapel of St Lesmo.

Gallow Hill Lochan is a new walk to the group. We start at Aboyne going into the Estate, passing a stone circle, up a track to the Coo Cathedral. This is a venue for weddings and it is a lovely setting with the castle in the back ground. Then along a lovely driveway which takes us onto the Tarland Way, onto a forest track to reach the lochan. There are benches beside the lochan which are perfect for lunch. On the way back we join the Deeside Way. I think this will be a regular walk in the future.
