### Middlefield resident praised for commitment to tenant engagement

An Aberdeen tenant is celebrating winning a prestigious award for his commitment to Tenant Participation.

The Tenant Information Service have honoured Aberdeen City Council tenant Paul McMenemy at their conference earlier this year. Paul won the Frances Nelson MBE award which celebrates the hard work of an individual who has made a real difference in their community or wider area.

Mr McMenemy has been actively involved in Tenant Participation at Aberdeen City Council for 11 years after hearing more about it a tenant open day. He quickly grew in confidence and was soon Chairman of a number of groups including the Aberdeen Housing Service Review Group. During his work with Tenant Participation Paul has undertaken a number of service reviews which aim to improve the Council's housing

services. He has also been instrumental in organising study visits from other local authorities as he believe that it is important to learn from other tenants and their landlords.

In addition to his work with Aberdeen City Council, Paul attends a number of community groups including his local community council where he is vice-chair and he is a board member of The Disabled Persons Housing Service.

Paul McMenemy said: "I was absolutely thrilled to win this award, but I can't take all of the credit. I would like to thank all of the other tenants, residents and volunteers I have met and worked with over the years as their efforts really do make a difference.

"Getting involved in tenant participation has helped give me a lot of confidence; I have



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made some good friends and developed new skills."

Aberdeen City Council Communities, Housing and Infrastructure convener Councillor Yvonne Allan said: "Aberdeen City Council has a strong record in Tenant Participation and we are proud to be recognised for the work we do in partnership with our tenants and residents.

"I am delighted that the enthusiasm Paul has for tenant engagement has been acknowledged. He and his fellow housing volunteers play an important role in helping us develop policies and improve services that benefit all of our council tenants.

"I would like to congratulate everyone involved in Tenant Participation and encourage them to keep up the good work."



### St Machar Parent Support Project News

If children don't receive the right support then the rest of their lives can be affected. That's why St Machar Parent Support Project was formed back in 1992. We were formed to help with educational attainment initially but we now provide a holistic approach enabling us to deal with all the varying issues that families are affected by.

The project's management committee is made up of locally elected people and we also have two advisors. There are five members of staff and we are based behind St Machar Academy in the old janitor's lodge. We are currently working within the St Machar Academy associated schools area and more recently we have been working jointly with Northfield Total Place, where it was identified that there was a need for support within the area.

We can attend meetings with parents and support parents, either on a one to one basis, or within a group. One of the unique services we offer is home visits, we can visit a family within their own home where they feel at ease allowing us to build a positive relationship from the onset.

We are needs led and can cover issues such as benefits, advice and support surrounding children with additional needs and Kinship care. The project also runs a Summer Playscheme for children and parents/carers that we have worked with within the year, we provide day trips out of the city at a very small cost to the family ensuring no one is excluded. Our parents' groups give people the opportunity to share advice and speak with other parents over common issues, staff at the project are experienced and approachable, and are therefore able to offer support in many ways.

If we don't know how to help we will find someone that can. We have many links with other agencies, in and around the city where we can find the right service for the need of the family.

Aberdeen City Council and the Fairer Aberdeen Fund contribute financially towards the running of the project alongside other funders.

We sometimes struggle for a venue as our own project is too small to have a crèche but we have successfully managed to run support groups within schools and local centres. The Kinship group is a great example of how beneficial a group is for those carers who feel isolated when facing bringing up a child/grandchild.

# Middlefield Opens its Doors

The first residents of a new development in the Middlefield area have moved into their homes. Aberdeen City Council are working with CHAP to build 99 new homes on the former Smithfield School site and the first twelve have been successfully let.

These properties have downstairs bathrooms and bedrooms so are ideal for residents with mobility issues. The whole development is a mixture of house types and sizes, from one-bedroom flats to four-bedroom houses. Aberdeen City Council hope that the next batch of houses in the Smithfield development will be completed by November and they will be able to get tenants in before Christmas. Every home in the Smithfield development has a private garden and it is expected that there will be green space and a playpark within the site. Just down the road, another

Just down the road, another eighty properties are being built next to Manor Walk. These will follow a similar design to the houses on the Smithfield site. Aberdeen City Council are anticipating the first lot of these homes being open to tenants from October this year. Homes will be released back to



the council gradually between October this year and early 2018.

There has been positive feedback from the residents who have moved into the area already.

Alan Cowie, Senior Housing Officer for the area said: "The new builds will take new people into the community who otherwise might not have come into the area.

"At the end of the day the allocation process comes down to need, so whoever has the most need will be prioritized."

# Northfield Academy

#### A new climbing wall facility was opened at Northfield Academy by former pupil, George Stevenson.

The state of the art facility, considered one of the best of any school in Scotland, is a first for the city.

The climbing wall facility was built by Scott Muir at Dream Climbing Walls Ltd in an unused classroom space and boasts 14 lead and bottom rope climbing wall with mega roof climb. It also has 30 set climbing routes using holds from a number of manufacturers. The bouldering wall has 20 set problems to challenge young people.

Mike Will, Acting Head Teacher at Northfield Academy, said: "Our climbing room is a fantastic resource for our pupils to be inspired and challenged and represents a significant investment in the health and wellbeing of young people in the Northfield community.

"We are grateful for the support of our generous donors and supporters who have transformed this project vision into a reality for our pupils to aspire to be outstanding."

The climbing wall is set to be used by school pupils in class times and sessions will be led by fully trained school staff. The climbing wall will

also enable pupils to work towards SQA qualifications and Mountaineering Scotland climbing awards.

The project was funded entirely through grants, donations and a highly successful rock concert at the Beach Ballroom featuring Ricky Warwick of the Black Star Riders, as organised by Steve Petrie of Balfour Beattie. Significant donations by former pupils and supporters of the school were also encouraged by Mr Stevenson.

### Geronimo at the Hub

Geronimo has arrived in Middlefield in the form of holiday playschemes for early year's children (0-5 years) and their parents. Following a successful start in the Easter holidays, sessions were planned for Summer and October by Middlefield Community Project in collaboration with the A.C.C. Creative Learning Team. These sessions are made possible by funding from Children in Need. The idea for the Under 5's playscheme came from parents looking for activities for their younger children while older brothers and sisters are involved in the Under 11s playscheme. A dozen or so families are involved in the Middlefield pilot project and they regularly give feedback which allows us to alter the programme to suit particular needs

Lindsay from the Creative Learning Team co-ordinates the tutor input for the sessions. Geronimo is all about play, making time to play as a family and as a community. It is about learning, exploring, risk taking, problem solving, building positive attachments through play but, most importantly, it is about taking the time out to play. Anywhere can be a playable space and anything, food for the imagination. Sessions are led by artists, enabling parents to play, making the leap into seeing things differently and facilitating their children's play. In

this environment they follow their child's lead with imagination and creativity being used to its maximum.

The Geronimo Project first started in Torry. Lindsay explains: "We know without doubt that children learn in their early years through play, we know that future inequality is already present when children reach the age of 5. To get it right for every child, to narrow or close the gap, we know that it must begin in early years. This is the challenge that Creative Learning has embraced through the Geronimo Project."

Geronimo @ the Hub is based at Middlefield Community Hub. The twice weekly play sessions are facilitated by 3 artists on a Wednesday and 2 musicians on a Friday who provide the materials and the space for the creativity, play and inspiration to happen. Playing together and experiencing the world through the eyes of the children fosters the sense of positive attachment. In addition the children are learning valuable creativity skills which contribute to learning flexibility, collaboration, problem solving and developing their imagination.

Geronimo shows that expensive materials are not necessary for quality creative and playful experiences, in fact less is more to encourage open ended play. We have so far had a session



devoted to cardboard boxes of all shapes and sizes (what child doesn't like a box to play in?!), also exploring making and playing with salt dough and play dough and outdoors sessions with Aberdeen Play Forum in loose parts play. Sessions are divided between indoors and outdoors in order to encourage families to explore the natural landscape around them. Each session ends with a shared sandwich lunch for parents and children to enjoy together, promoting the sense of community.

The project has had ongoing tangible benefits. In the evaluation from the pilot project in Torry, parents reported how their confidence and their children's curiosity and confidence grew with each session. The ultimate impact measurement, however, will come when the children enter school and, with nurture, it is hoped the Geronimo generation will have a head start.

The summer holidays have very much been enjoyed by all the children attending our nursery. They have been on outings to Dizzy Rascals Indoor Play Centre at Laurencekirk and Smugglers Cove down at Aberdeen beach. At both settings, the children benefited from lots of energetic fun and the treat of having lunch at the café, where they were very excited at being

able to choose their own food from the menus. Some children liked the food so much that they licked their plates clean! The children also liked going on the different modes of transport during these outings. Nursery Garden Developments. Now that we have been in our setting a while, the Nurseries will be looking to see how they can effectively develop the current outdoor space into an exciting and stimulating play area, providing a variety of high quality learning opportunities. Clearly this improvement project is going to be ongoing and will take time. However, we would love input from all of our service users as to any suggestions of potential developments or resources that they would like us to plan into the garden improvements. Recently we have been very fortunate to secure funding from ASDA and also earlier on in the year The Coop, to help finance these developments. We would like to thank both these organisations for their kind donations. These will greatly help fund some new resources. However, we are also looking at being cost effective and innovative in developing our children's learning opportunities by using natural items such as logs and tree stumps. Furthermore, we are considering other items such as tyres, pipes, guttering, cable drums, crates and other similar loose parts play resources. These all have fantastic benefits and enhance children's potential learning opportunities.

Such resources actively encourage open ended learning, problem solving and developing creativity. Loose parts resources help to develop more skill and competence than most modern plastic toys. They can be moved, carried, combined, redesigned, lined up, and taken apart and put back together in multiple ways. They are materials with no specific set of directions that can be used alone or combined with other materials. Loose parts can be natural or synthetic. We look forward to working in partnership will all our service users to create a fantastic outdoor learning space for all our children to enjoy.

By offering a free £50 joint junior savings promotion with St Machar Credit Union, 25 new accounts have been opened.

Visitors to the stall could enter a free prize draw to win £20 of Lintmill Butcher Voucher and pick up Fareshare breakfast cereal/ bars and muesli.

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In our Spring edition, we announced the exciting news that the Station House Media Unit building in Woodside would undergo a million pound make-over following a successful application to the Scottish Government Regeneration Capital Fund. Work begins in late August on the new purpose-built accommodation, which will significantly extend our existing building. The new building will include new radio studios, a recording studio, TV studio, an IT suite, improved training facilities, an edit suite and some fantastic new social space. The building will also be the main office base for the organisation. During the estimated 12 month building period, staff and services will be based at Aberdeen City Council's Rosehill House Day Centre on Ashgrove Road West.

The relocation is due to take place during the week commencing 21st August with CHAP

Although this is a time of upheaval, it is also a time of opportunity, with Rosehill House offering more space to develop our services and try out new work before returning to our new building. #### Supporting Schools in Cummings Park & Middlefield

Improving the education and life chances of our children and young people is imperative, and I am pleased at hearing the recent news confirming that three of our local schools will receive additional funding through The Scottish Attainment Challenge. The funding is part of a Scottish Government initiative to support schools in raising the attainment of their pupils, with £750 million being invested through the five-year term of this Parliament.

In the 2017/18 academic year over £597,000 will be shared among 7

Aberdeen City Schools, and I am delighted that three of those schools are in my Aberdeen Donside constituency and within the communities of Cummings Park and Middlefield -Bramble Brae Primary, Manor Park Primary and Northfield Academy are among those that will benefit from the funding.

The money is being earmarked for schools to aid them in further prioritising improvements in literacy, numeracy and the health and wellbeing of children. New paths have been planned to traverse the area currently known as Heathryfold Park – the work will be undertaken by the end of this financial year.
