MIDDLEFIELD PARK AND GREENSPACE PROJECT UPDATE

Middlefield gets its very own community ranger as the community begin forming a vision for the new park.

Work is continuing to progress on the new park in Middlefield being created as part of the Middlefield Project. The scheme has received funding from the Scottish National Heritage Green Infrastructure Fund, with additional funding coming from Aberdeen City Council, Nestrans and Sustrans. The aim is to create a new user-friendly community park out of scrubland, and it includes raising the Scatterburn from underground to above ground to work as a flood alleviation scheme. The project is also creating new pedestrian and cycle friendly paths, improved pavements on two streets beside the development, and installing new landscaping to create an attractive park area which will be user-friendly to the residents living in the surrounding areas.

A new community ranger, Vicky Ewan, has now started working in the Middlefield area on the project. Her role will be to promote and support environmental activities in the park and surrounding green spaces among residents, along with undertaking curriculum-related environmental activities in conjunction with local schools. The aim is to get the community out and about enjoying exploring the park and local wildlife as well as looking at ways to support local biodiversity. She is keen to hear any thoughts or ideas you may have. If you want to discuss anything with her, please contact Fran on the email address below and she will put you in touch.

The park itself is now in an exciting phase of development, as contractors have now finished work on some of the site including raising the Scatterburn, adding fencing at the allotments, and forming the bunds. Work on other parts of the site including creating the cycle/walking paths is likely to start soon. Things are hotting up as the community steering group are now discussing ideas for what they want in the new park, such as new play parks and equipment,

new trees and plants, and an area for community growing. This is in addition to deciding how they want the park to look once the landscaping commences. New community members are welcome to join the group, so if you want a chance to have your say in what the park should have, you are more than welcome to join the community steering group and come along to the meetings. If you want to find out more or even just fancy getting out for a wee tour of the park to see how things are progressing, please give Fran a shout!

Middlefield Community Project

Under 11's Easter Playscheme 2018

The playscheme was planned by volunteers from Middlefield Community Project and organised by staff. This was to focus around the children who attend our under 11's groups on a regular basis. The reason for this was that we get to know the children before we take them away on trips. If there are spaces left after our groups have booked in, then we open to other families and we put this on our Facebook page.

We booked Northfield Swimming Pool for the playscheme but it had to close for refurbishment. We had to then find some other activities to fill the gap. We rearranged the trip and were very grateful that Aberdeen Science Centre were able to accommodate 50 children at short notice and allow us to visit them. They put on two different science sessions: one was small scientific things like how energy works, and the children loved seeing how after you rub a balloon

with your hair you can then move an empty can around without touching it. They then showed the tuning fork and how it vibrated, and we could see this when it was put in water. The second session was about volcanos and I was very impressed as a lot of the children had a lot of knowledge of stone types (seemingly from playing Minecraft) then they went on to build their own volcanoes. They added different chemicals and watched how they reacted together to get the foam to come over the top and down the sides. Then the children had a look around enjoying the interactive nature of the centre.

We then came back to the centre where they made squishy bags of slime with Lori, made some chocolate nests and did games in the hall.

On the Friday we were very lucky as Ron Bird and a few of his drumming friends gave the children an opportunity to try drumming for an hour and they had great fun. On their way home, they all received an

Easter egg that we had received from the Trinity Centre to hand out to the children who were all delighted.

On Wednesday we were off to Blair Drummond Safari Park and the children had a great time, seeing the animals (seals, penguins, lions, deer, birds of prey, the giraffes, monkeys, rhinos and so on). They loved the newly built tower and the zip line. When we went to see the penguins they wanted to come back to see the penguin speak to them. Some were on the pedal boats and the boat to see the monkeys and all had a great time. The volunteers did a great job looking after the children needs and got the round the whole of the attractions.

Adult Art Group

Hello. My name is Lori and I just started (again) with Middlefield Community Project in March 2018 as a Community Development Worker. I have had the pleasure to take over the Adult Art Group. The Art Group prepared Easter Crafts for the nursery children to sell and have also had an Easter Raffle with a 1st, 2nd and 3rd prize draw. Money raised from our Easter sales and raffle totalled just over £146 with funds being split between the nurseries and the Art Group. Congratulations to Angie (1st place winner), Thomas (2nd place winner) and Zoey (3rd place winner).

Our Art Group meets on a Tuesday morning from 9:30-11:30 during school term times. The current members suggested that each person pay £1 each session to go towards stocking up supplies. We are discussing future projects at the moment and hope to welcome some new members. We have different levels of creativity in this group with some bringing special talents of their own. Some ideas that were put forward were painting, floating candles, sewing and Christmas crafts.

I am excited to be a part of this and look forward to all the exciting ideas coming to life.



Geronimo

We are in our second year of Geronimo @ The Hub. Geronimo is a project for parents and their children under the age of 5 years, including babies. The early years are the most important in children's development where they will gain many skills needed in life. Geronimo helps strengthen relationships between parents and their children while being creative and playful. During Geronimo sessions we incorporate movement and dance, singing, being creative with every day household items, sensory play and messy play. Geronimo encourages parents to see the world through their child's eyes and encourages parents to follow their lead.

Some parents commented they enjoyed the messy play because they were not able to do this at

home. Others commented that the children (and adults) enjoyed the singing and dancing. One parent commented the Geronimo group helped her daughter build on her socialisation skills and helped "bring her out of her shell". Most parents said it was a good opportunity to meet other parents with children of similar ages.

Geronimo is held two days a week during school holidays and there are place for 15 families. It is on a first come first serve basis however you must be in the catchment area of Middlefield Community Project.



Nursery Garden developments

The nurseries were successful in raising £287 from their Christmas crafts sale. They also managed to raise £1048 from the sponsored Josie Jump fun day and sponsored walk. Staff, parents and children all enjoyed being involved. This money was put towards the cost of the new nursery garden fence to improve children's safety and security. The fence is now completed and helps to ensure the children are all within the main garden space and visible to all staff.

We are pleased that our new artificial grass in the nursery garden is also now finished. It took longer than first anticipated due to the poor weather conditions experienced over the past few months. However finally the children are now enjoying and benefiting from the increased space and the fact that we will be

able to use it whatever the weather. We have also used our funding that we received last year from the Coop to purchase some fantastic new outdoor resources to support, extend and challenge the children. Furthermore, these resources will help to provide a varied breadth of high quality learning opportunities.

We have bought a selection of different sized natural wooden blocks to help develop children's construction, creativity and imagination skills. These will also help to develop the children's skills and ability to cooperate and work together to create models. We have also purchased a set of larger natural wooden cubes. These are great as they can be used for a variety of purposes. They will be effective in helping to develop children's climbing skills, role play, creative, risk assessing and imagination skills. They will be able

to use the cubes to create dens houses or whatever the children pretend the cubes are.

The staff are hoping to involve the parents and children in other future developments to further increase the variety of high quality learning opportunities on offer to all of our children. We are hoping to create a variety of different learning zones within our garden. We are lucky because at the moment the garden is very much a blank canvas and gives scope for much development. The areas that we are looking to create include a quiet/seating, sensory/wild, planting (fruit and veg), mud kitchen/role play, water play, construction, music and creative spaces. We will keep you updated of our progress.



Some thanks you

We would like to say a big thank you to one of our staff member's dad (Derek Henderson) who kindly gave us some fantastic cable drums for the garden. The children love these for climbing on and using within their role play.

We would also like to thank the STV Children's Appeal who kindly donated us £2000. This will be used to get some new outdoor clothing for the children and also the staff so that everybody has the appropriate clothing to enjoy the benefits of the garden whatever the weather.

We would also like to thank the structural and flood alleviation group who has been meeting at the hub and working within the Middlefield community, for their kind offer of building us a mud kitchen. The children will thoroughly enjoy using this as part of their role play but further learning and benefits will also include science, sharing and exploration, for example digging, measuring, volume, capacity, consistencies etc.

PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING IN NORTHFIELD

A great day was had by all at the UDecide voting day at Northfield Academy on 17th March 2018. The success of the day and, the local process, was in no small part due to the dedicated volunteer steering group, supported by the Locality 2 communities' staff, which has been instrumental in shaping the participatory budgeting process in Northfield.

Out of 16 fabulous project ideas put forward by local people, 7 projects were fully funded and 2 were partially funded. This year's Participatory Budgeting fund for Northfield and the local people who came out to vote mean that the following projects will become a reality for the people of Mastrick, Northfield, Cummings Park, Heathryfold and Middlefield. The range of new activities which will be available to local people will positively impact the whole community, from the very young to the very old.

Community Café - Mastrick
Parish Church will receive £3000
to develop a new community café
in the heart of Mastrick - a space
for people to meet and enjoy a
cuppa and a chat, particularly
looking to encourage carers and
young families to come
and socialise.

Awesome Tech in Northfield Academy – The group will receive £1880 to run a 5-week course with the Northfield Science Club for up to 20 pupils aged 11-17. We will take the participants through a project-based programme, building, maintaining, controlling and programming autonomous vehicles in a fun and challenging course.

Veterans Aberdeen - The North East Scotland Disabled Veterans Association will receive £2,600 to allow them to offer an extra weekly session, which provides friendship, support, hot meal/snacks, and companionship to ensure veterans living on their own do not suffer long periods without care and contact.

Simple Glory – A local group of young people will receive £800 to allow them to take their own float to Grampian Pride in May, to highlight LGBT issues and how important groups like theirs are for young people who are at risk of social isolation

Lunchtime Drama Club – A local lad working with Shazam Theatre will receive £2,360 to provide two schools in Northfield the opportunity to run free weekly lunchtime drama groups, which will informal and fun and would focus on basic drama skills and games.

Extreme Summer – Transition Extreme will receive £3000 to support young people and their families to access positive community engagement opportunities and providing an alternative for young people at risk of taking part in risk-taking and anti-social behaviour, through running free skate park coaching sessions through the summer

Boogie at the bar – AFCCT will receive £1500 to host a free dementia friendly disco once a month in the Sunnybank Social Club, which will include music, dancing and a light lunch. Those who attend will be able to dance, have a drink and a wee blether in a safe and friendly environment.

MUSC: Meet You in St Clements

Church will receive £638.50 as
part funding to improve their
kitchen facilities, to allow them to
increase and improve their free
school holiday meals provision to
local children

Streetsport – The Denis Law Legacy Trust will receive £638.50 as part funding to allow their free weekly Streetsport session at the Bill Burr astro in Northfield to continue. This attracts over 100 young people every week and provides a safe, fun and positive environment for young people.



The Youth Work in Schools Team at Northfield Academy and staff from the Capacity Building Team have been supporting a group of young people from Northfield Academy in developing skills and confidence around playing musical instruments, performing, team working and responsibility. The young people have formed a band called Simple Glory, the line-up has been flexible making them more of a musical collective with vocals, electric and acoustic guitars, bass guitar, ukulele and drums. They have learned a number of songs by their favourite bands and artists such as Panic at the Disco and 5 Seconds of Summer.

They have taken every opportunity to perform live and in front of an audience including a charity fundraiser and a Burns' Day Lunch at Cummings Park Learning Centre, the Duke of Edinburgh Awards Prize Giving at the Beach Ballroom and most recently at the UDecide event at Northfield Academy on the 17th of March where they had been supported by local Capacity Builders to make an application

for funding to hire a float and perform at the Grampian Pride Parade in May 2018. Two of the group confidently gave a quick presentation about the experiences they have had and how they had grown in confidence. It was no shock when they were successful in their bid for £800. Congratulations to Alicia, Kelsey, Ella, Ike, Heather, Kim, Emily, Morgan, Ellis and Elliott for working hard to achieve their goal.

In addition to the hard work on a musical theme, members of the group are also engaged at Cummings Park Learning Centre in a project to decorate the Music Room.


There are a range of people to whom thanks must go to; Kev, Fran and Sara from the Capacity Building Team and to members of the St Nicholas Rotary who were instrumental in the establishment of this activity for young people. Of course I couldn't forget our Youth Worker Dave Holroyd and the enabling role he plays with the group.

Plans for the future include taking time to reflect on their

experiences and write them up in a Dynamic Youth Award (SCQF Level 3), to develop opportunities for skills development around instrument maintenance including re-stringing, setting up and making repairs to electronics (anyone who has put a guitar into an luthier to be set up will know that this a cost they would rather avoid). Group members that have art skills are being engaged in designing a piece of work for the float for the parade.

In summary these young people are developing their competence in hard and soft skills which is creating new confidence for them; they are demonstrating this by taking on leadership and coordination roles as the band progresses and develops, discovering new abilities which are feeding into new aspirations such as volunteering opportunities and preparing to stay on at school for further study and to apply to be part of the incredible Prefect Team at Northfield.

Communities throughout the North East, and Northfield in particular, are not without their challenges but changes are possible and according to the residents, the work of the community and partners working in and around Oldtown have made a positive difference.

On Tuesday 27 March, Police, along with a range of partners including SFRS, youth workers, councillors, Street Pastors, City Wardens and housing officials hosted a third drop-in session where anyone with concerns about local issues could pop along for advice.

A similar multi-agency session held in October was extremely successful in identifying emerging issues and allowed officials to take proactive action early on to tackle potential problems including littering, vandalism and fly-tipping.

It was a fantastic opportunity for residents to get access to all the right people in one place who can help tackle the issues which affect the area most. Everyone who was in attendance on that night has a duty of care to work with the community to make a difference, but we need residents to work with us to tell us their concerns to help us do this.

The determination and effort of all those involved has resulted in significant reductions in crime and Anti-Social Behaviour. The focus will be helped over the coming months by continued partnership working and a strong Policing presence.

The regeneration of Middlefield has been ongoing for several years and involved community consultation as a key part of the process. Being shortlisted in the 2017 SURF awards in the category of Scotland's Most Improved Place is a fantastic achievement to all involved.

During February, officers from Northfield carried out an operation in Middlefield to target one of our local Priorities, Road Safety and Road Crime, which was identified by the community as a local issue. The operation was carried out between Thursday 15 February and Friday 16 February and checked vehicles for road-worthiness and associated safety issues.

The operation was assisted by Road Policing officers and in total, 154 motorists were stopped, warned, educated or reported for any offences identified. Road safety and tackling road crime is a priority for us in the Northfield area. Through listening to our community we have addressed some of their concerns.

Faces will change but our work will continue and as a CPT we will remain visible and accessible within Northfield and will strive to address the issues that you raise. #NorthfieldCPT

Spring is in the Air!

Spring has finally arrived so now's the time to spring clean your finances! Cash in Your Pocket (CIYP) can help you!

CIYP aims to help anyone in need to access the right support and advice to improve their finances. By providing a single point of contact, we can refer you on to the most appropriate organisation(s) to get the help you need.

By getting out and about in the community, we can speak to directly to people. This is often when they identify they have a problem and need information or advice. If you get help quickly, you're less likely to reach crisis point.

In March CIYP had an information stand at the Hub, along with an

advisor from Scarf's Home Energy Advice Team, and shmuFM, who were recruiting local volunteers. We spoke to almost 30 people including members of a Kinship Carers group. We had queries about free childcare and the blue badge scheme, and Scarf were able to arrange 6 follow up home visits to give energy-related advice.

We are planning to hold more events like this in the Middlefield area soon so keep an eye out for our posters and on our Facebook page!

The Big Move

Work is well underway at shmuHQ in Woodside. Our contractors, CHAP, have been hard at work since August last year and haven't been put off by the cold snap we recently experienced.

We have secured a significant amount of funding to pay for the fabric of the building, but we are currently working hard on a fundraising strategy to ensure we have enough money to pay for the equipment to turn it from a fantastic building to a state of the art community media centre.

Our aim is to enhance the facilities we already have so we will install two new radio studios and we will have a big communal social area, similar to what we had in the old building but we're also going to have an IT training room and a TV studio with a control room. We want to use the expansion of the building to expand our existing programmes to reach new people in our target areas.

A state-of-the-art building was identified as a need as part of our 2010-2017 strategic plan so we're really excited that this is becoming a reality for us this year.





Youth Media Team try their

Members of shmu's Youth Media Team got involved with the Nuart festival this year. They worked with artist, Carrie Reichtardt, on her project Everyday Heroes. At the latest Communities Housing and Infrastructure Committee, a report was discussed on the outcomes of the soft market testing that was undertaken for retail/housing/greenspace or for retail/greenspace at the Haudagain Triangle. The administration stated that there should be further market testing undertaken and the results will be Aberdeen City Council's "aspiration" which will be moved forward. We disagreed with that view for a number of reasons and put forward an amendment that it should be the Middlefield community's aspirations.

You have made it extremely clear to us in the past that the land should be for retail/greenspace. This was backed up with the report stating that there was definite interest in the retail aspect but no interest in the single person housing units. We lost the debate by 1 vote which means that we still do not know what the firm plans are for the land. We now have to wait for market testing with potential developers to take place before the community and ourselves will be informed.

We have also been involved in the Heathryfold Park improvements and are happy to see that work is now

being carried out. If you wish to get involved with this project, please contact either of us or pop into The Hub.

Ciaran has been working with various departments within the council to ensure that the old Logie shops are made secure after recent break-ins and suspicious activity. Police Scotland have also been involved by sweeping the area in the evening to ensure that no illegal activity is ongoing. IMPROVEMENTS TO PLAY PARKS

Some of the play parks that have been refurbished or replaced as part of the council's improvement plan include Bonnyview Road; Manor Avenue; Newton Road and work is currently being completed at Oldtown.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

Environmental improvement proposals have been developed in consultation with a community steering group formed to participate further in this project, and the other projects noted below.

ACTIVE TRAVEL PROJECT (NESTRANS)

Following road safety concerns from people using the new Community Hub Nestrans have offered £150,500 to:

- improve the crossings of Provost Rust Drive and Manor Avenue; and
- provide directional signs; these are due to be completed in March 18.

Following discussion with the community improvement steering group design works have been agreed.

AUCHMILL COMMUNITY WOODLAND

I love to relax and take my dog for a walk around the area especially the woodlands and footpaths that we are fortunate to have. I am delighted to say that the Heathryfold Park Steering Group and Council officers are looking to work with Scottish Natural Heritage to get funding of up to £300k to progress this and other projects in the area such as providing grasscrete to the land opposite the flats at Heathryfold Circle to allow parking without damaging the grass. The steering group had a walk around the woodland with the park ranger to identify suitable sites for equipment and areas to build an outside classroom.
