Tillydrone Vision 2018 Trip

Tillydrone Vision are planning another trip to Uganda during the Easter holidays next year. The charity work with the community of Tillydrone to support a primary school in Kamuli in Uganda by providing them with items donated from local people and working on projects like building a clean water pump. It allows people to come together to help people who are in a much worse situation themselves.

They recently launched their container, which some of you may have seen as you pass the church on Hayton Road. This container will be filled with items that people have donated to the community in Uganda.

Bill Mitchell, Secretary of Tillydrone Vision said: "Even if it's just one single bar of soap when we put that together with another 23 single bars of soap, we have a case of soap and that makes a huge difference to the lives out there."

The container will leave Tillydrone in October so it arrives in the school in Uganda before Christmas at which point the kids (all 2000

of them) should manage to get something simple, like a pair of shoes or some new clothing that will make difference in their lives.

Tillydrone

Bill said: "During our last visit we think that 30% of the kids had shoes which means that 70% don't. Shoes are a big thing – they prevent injury to feet and if feet have got scratches and cuts they pick up infections and then there's a lot of illness. The people in Uganda have to pay for healthcare and a lot of them can't afford it so simple infections can be almost deadly in Uganda."

If you would like to donate you can do so by dropping items off at the church - the team are looking for anything from hygiene products to shoes to school stationery. They can't take anything over which requires electricity or batteries and their rule of thumb is 'if you wouldn't wear it yourself or put it on your own child then please don't give it to us.'

Locality Planning - what does it mean for Tillydrone?

Community Planning Aberdeen are looking to work with people in the Tillydrone area to create a Locality Partnership. They have created a draft locality plan which has used information taken from local people at events throughout 2016 to create a ten-year plan for Woodside, Seaton and Tillydrone. It lays out the priorities of the community and some ideas for making improvements.

The Locality Partnership will be made up of representatives from third sector, private and public service partners as well as at least 50% of the group will be members of the community. The partnership should ensure effective working between local staff and residents and will give local people more of a say over decisions which affect the

area. The partnership will meet 6-8 times a year and the minutes for these meetings will be published on the Community Planning Aberdeen website and will be accessible to the public. For more information visit communityplanningaberdeen.org.uk.

Some of the key issues for the area include improving health and wellbeing, increasing access to healthy food, improving attainment, improving transport, ensuring high quality housing, increase access to free wifi and digital skills, improve facilities for the area and increase local employment levels.

So, what does this actually mean for folk who live in Tillydrone?

Improving Health and Wellbeing and increasing Access to Healthy Food

The Locality Partnership will look at options for growing food locally and setting up a market which would provide cheap fruit and veg which is easily accessible. There are more children eligible for free school meals than are currently taking them so the group hope to increase the uptake of this opportunity to help take some pressure off parents. They aim to increase the amount of sporting and exercise opportunities in the area and to encourage the community to become active and get fitter.

Improving Attainment

The development of the new Tillydrone Hub and primary school for the area forms part of the plan to reduce the gap in attainment between the highest and lowest achieving pupils. The new hub will increase the amount of local childcare and Early Years Places which are available to young people. Free childcare opportunities and these opportunities will be offered at non-traditional times as lots of families in the area work shift patterns and don't always need childcare at the times it is currently offered.

Improving Transport

Gaps in public transport will be identified and fed back to the relevant providers. The group will also investigate alternative arrangements, for example using a low-cost car-share scheme or volunteer drivers to improve access to essential services, for example the hospital.

Ensure High Quality Housing

More affordable housing will be built in the area and the current housing stock will be maintained to a high standard. The council's housing team will work closely with tenants to increase their satisfaction in their homes and the service they receive. The housing stock will also have to meet current Scottish quality standards.

Increase Access to Free Wifi and Digital Skills

The Community Planning
Partnership will work with
communities and private partners
to make sure that residents of
Tillydrone have strong WiFi
connections. This will help reduce
social isolation as people will
be able to maintain strong links
with family and friends and can
access information. There will
also be an increase in community
groups and projects who support
local people to develop their skills
with computers, tablets and the
Internet.

Improve Facilities in the Area

Many playparks in the Tillydrone area have been refurbished over the last 18 months and this will continue as part of the

locality plan. The Tillydrone
Hub will provide a central space
for services and groups to
meet and provide facilities for
Tillydrone residents, for example
the community café. As well as
focusing on playparks and green
spaces, the group aim to reduce
fly-tipping and littering in the
community to keep the area tidy
and presentable.

Increase Employment Levels

Barriers to employment will be removed. This will involve making childcare more accessible and affordable, getting organisations in place to support people to get and keep a job, as well as supporting people who have an idea to start up their own business. Working age adults will have access to education opportunities locally. There will be even more support for school leavers to make sure that they have somewhere positive to go after school, whether that be further education, a job or training.

New Councillors in Tillydrone

On May 4th 2017 three councillors were elected to represent the Seaton, Tillydrone and Old Aberdeen areas. Councillor Ross Grant and Councillor Jim Noble were both re-elected to represent the community and Alexander McLellan was elected to represent the areas for the first time.

Remember, even if these individuals were not your first choice, they have been elected to represent you and support you with any issues in the area.

The meat was in the ground, we had a big metal milk container dug into the earth and the packet of bacon was dropped back in there and covered up. There was a big table outside but we didn't sit at the table. We sat around the fire, silent, except for the noise of snap, crackle, pop.

Hear my Rice Crispies, I giggled. We all giggled. We sat that morning at breakfast time, staring into the fire, breathing into smoke and unbeknown creating happy, joyful memories.

I'm soo happy she left the lid open...


Let the stench out, yeaaah!

TRANSFORMING THE INTERNET INTO A SAFE SPACE

Local charity Choices Aberdeen go online with their new counselling service

At Choices we are passionate about getting people talking about difficult issues, and helping them find closure and healing by giving them a safe space to open up and be listened to. This is the motivation behind our crisis pregnancy counselling service, which exists for women and couples facing an unexpected pregnancy. We offer, in the words of one of our past clients, 'a place where I could talk, cry and have space to just be.'

In a society where we increasingly live our lives online, we can benefit from the ability this gives us to communicate in new and creative ways. For a lot of people, online spaces are where they find their identity and feel most safe to talk about their problems. At Choices we always want to find new ways to reach out to people, and take full advantage of these changing attitudes. With this in mind, we have recently created an online counselling service. Accessed via a secure server, this allows clients to speak to find that 'space to just be' without ever having to leave the safety of their home. For those with busy parenting or work schedules, or who just don't feel ready for face-to-face counselling, this is an ideal option.

Whilst the internet is a valuable resource, we are also aware that, especially for young people, the internet can be an increasingly risky and frightening place. If you go to St Machar Academy you may have seen our youth team about in school, where you can recognise us by our purple hoodies. We run events to promote positive relationships, and put on workshops to get you all talking about resilience, peer pressure, exploitation and the role of social media in our relationships. The youth team keep up to date with developments in technology, and use our workshops and drop-ins to promote online safety and make young people aware of the risks out there.

Everybody helped out and the day came to a brilliant end with the grand opening of our village barn, built by us villagers. It was wrapped in red ribbon and we celebrated the opening with much happiness. We are excited for our summer fayre on August 12th. One thing's for sure we do have lots of community spirit going around here.



Donside Hydro Overview

Donside Hydro is a community built hydro scheme, on the river Don, adjacent to Donside Village in Tillydrone. It is Scotland's first urban community hydro scheme (most others are situated in isolated parts of the country).

The scheme has won a number of awards since operations began last September, including the best Community Project at the Scottish Green Energy awards, Best Newcomer at the ACVO awards and several awards at Aberdeen's own Ecocity awards.

Whilst the turbine is fully operational, and we have been producing electricity since 21st Sept 2016 and are meeting all projected targets, the landscaping is ongoing and there is still a bit of work to be done. Everything had to be put on 'pause' for the salmon migration and spawning season – we don't want to do anything to disturb our natural environment!

We have just finished planting over 500 trees on our newly created island and further landscaping will take place over the next year. This will include the building of a bridge across to the island, and ensuring that as much of the area as possible is wheelchair accessible. We are sorry for the temporary lack of

access, but the site will be open to all once we have completed our essential work.

Volunteers have been a critical part of this project – everyone involved is a volunteer, from the directors to the lovely folk who come along and give their precious time to help us reach our goals!

If you are interested in volunteering, please check out our Facebook site (Aberdeen Community Energy), where regular volunteer events are advertised. Current volunteers have said how much they have enjoyed being able to be a part of something so special and going away from the day feeling a huge sense of achievement and personal satisfaction.

Profits from the scheme will be given to the shareholders and bond holders, who have helped to finance the scheme, but a percentage of the profits will be returned to the community association, and this will be used to further develop the area and create a lovely public amenity for all who come to this part of the Don. However, this will not happen until the first full year of production at the earliest.

The Donside Village Community Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) is working with the Scottish Government's Scottish Land Fund to purchase the land surrounding the Donside Hydro. The aim is deliver a park for locals and visitors of all ages to play, explore, recreate and educate. We are at stage 2 of our application and it is progressing well. However, the Scottish Land Fund are unable to fully finance any land purchases and can only give us 90% of the value of the land. We are currently fund raising at every opportunity to raise the necessary cash (e.g. all profits from our Spring Fayre has gone toward the land purchase. people from the village ran in the Baker Hughes 10k to raise money etc).

We are also seeking alternative ways of funding and have started to charge for seminars and tours, where it is reasonable to do so, whilst keeping in mind our desire to make the hydro as accessible as possible to all.

We won our bid in the recent
Participatory Budgets (thanks
so much to everyone who voted
for this) and are now planning
a lovely shelter and seating in
the viewing area for the hydro
– it's going to be special, and
in keeping with the gorgeous
riverside setting and the heritage
of the site, with the old walls and
mill history – watch this space!

Living streets

Living Streets Scotland are working with the Locality 3 team to look at Traffic Safety in Tillydrone with initial talks focusing in and around the Diamond Bridge and Hayton Road areas.

A public meeting was held on the 9th May at Tillydrone Community Centre where discussions were had with local people to begin addressing traffic congestion, pollution, speeding, tailgaiting, driver behaviour, cycling and signposting.

The lead community organisation to take the initiative forward has been tentatively agreed as Tillydrone Community Council where the findings from the event will be presented. An initial report will be made up by Living Streets for this purpose with a view to further community engagement and potential audits to take place.

Some immediate actions have already been taken with a request and agreement with the CCTV unit to adjust the camera positioning to observe the Lollipop lady who has been receiving abuse from drivers and individuals. The Locality 3 team will also increase contact with the Lollipop lady and investigate further internal supports.

What's in a name

The Tilly Tattle's very own historian, Margaret Mead aims to bring our readers a touch of local history. All the streets in Tillydrone have been named after people and Margaret will be bringing you the stories behind these characters.

Ritchie Place

Sir Neil Methuen Ritchie GBE, KCB, DSO, MC, K St J.

Born in British Guiana now Guyana on 29th July 1897. His first regiment was Black Watch then he commanded the 2nd Bat Kings Own Royal Regiment (Lancaster). Then 51st Highland Infantry Division, Eight Army 52nd Infantry Division, XII Corps, Scottish Command; Far East Land Forces and he served in both wars.

Later in the Battle of Normany he received many medals for his campaigns, even from France, Poland and the USA. Once in Civvy Street he worked as a chairman for an insurance company. Colonel of the Black Watch (Royal Highland Regiment) between 1950 and 1952. He died in Canada in 1983, December the 11th.

Rear-Admiral George Stephen Ritchie CB DSO

He was born 30th of October 1914 and died 8th May 2012. He was a former British Admiral, noted for his cartographic and hydrographic work. His parents were Sir Douglas Ritchie and Lady Margaret Stephen Ritchie. Educated at Royal Naval College Dartsmouth from the age of 13 years, he then went to sea at 17 years old.


In 1936, aged 22, he joined the Surveying Service and was appointed to the old cola burning ship, H.M.S Herland, operating in the South China Sea. During the Second World War Lieutenant Ritchie was awarded the DSCO for bravery behind enemy lines, surveying the beaches. He continued in this area of the navy, commanding four ships during that time which were

H.M.S Challenger in the Northern Atlantic area, H.M.S Dalrymyte in the Persian Gulf, H.M.S Vidal in the West Indies and H.M.M.Z.S Lachlan in the Pacific Ocean. In 1951, he was involved in recording the deepest part of the Atlantic Ocean by echo sounding with the H.M.S Challenger. The depth was 5, 960 fathoms or 10,900 or 35, 761ft. In 1955, he was made Rear Admiral and appointed to Hydrographer of the navy in the RN Survey Squadron. For 18 months he was Senior Research Fellow at Southampton University.

In 1967 he received the Companion of Bath. Admiral Ritchie received the Founders Medal of the Royal Geographical Society and the gold medal of the Royal Institute of Navigation. He received many accolades.

Twice a year in the Easter and October Holidays City Church St Machar run M.A.D.
