Hazel McAllan, Chairperson of Balnagask Community Centre is amongst the sixteen people from the North-East and Moray who have been included in the Queen's Birthday Honours list this year.

Hazel has received the British Empire Medal (BEM) for services to the community, including going above and beyond when the community centre had to be used as a shelter in December 2015 after fires at a car service centre on Girdleness Road.

In Hazel's own words she said: "I am absolutely over the moon to let you all know that I have received a B.E.M (British empire medal) in the Queen's Birthday Honours for services to the community. I have stayed in Torry all my life and worked within the community for over 40 years. In that time, I've had the pleasure of making some fabulous friends, seeing kids grow into adults and have their own children. Coming to the Kermit club for parties, mother and toddlers and to enjoy our clubs and play schemes like they did. Along the way I've worked alongside some amazing people who prove that team work really does make the dream work. This honour isn't just for me but for all of you who have helped in some way or another. Thanks for your continued support and making working in

the community a joy over the years. Here's to the next 40!"

Tributes came pouring in from family members and members of the community, including Torry Community Council and Old Torry Community Centre who wanted to congratulate Hazel on her award and all her hard work in Torry over the last 40 years.

Torry Cruyff Court

As you may know, a Cruyff Court will soon be built on the Tullos pitches, replacing the current astroturf pitch.

Cruyff Courts are outdoor, artificial football pitches that are free to use by the community. We are delighted that the Torry Community is going to have access to this fantastic free facility and the opportunity to participate in activities associated with the Johan Cruyff Foundation and Denis Law Legacy Trust.

The design for the hard surface element of the court as selected through a series of community engagement sessions, including speaking with Schools and a variety of community groups has now been submitted to the architect. The hard surface pitch will include:

- One full size basketball court with adjustable hoops;
- This will be overlapped with two 5 ball dodgeball courts;
- Two mini tennis courts to the left with two freestyle football circles in between

This then leaves the top and bottom sections for chalked activities such as hopscotch or tic-tac-toe and the potential to add some outdoor gym equipment.

The plan is for there to be a solar lit path (not pictured) leading from the

Tullos Learning Centre to the court, and a disabled access ramp will be installed so the court will be fully accessible.

We are currently working with the local community to decide on what the 10 rules for the Torry Cruyff Court will be and are working behind the scenes to come up with a name for the court.

We do not have a start date for the work to begin, although all being well and depending on weather, we hope that you can begin to enjoy using the Cruyff Court by the end of 2019!

RSPB DOLPHINWATCH LAUNCHES PROGRAMME OF SUMMER EVENTS FOR 2019

RSPB Dolphinwatch prepares to entertain visitors this summer with new wildlife events in Aberdeen.

Dolphinwatch will celebrate Scottish marine life this summer with three engaging family events, as well as regular rockpooling sessions and beach cleans. Now in its seventh year, the RSPB Scotland-led project, is based at Torry Battery, a spot which has a growing reputation as one of the best places to see bottlenose dolphins in Europe.

Returning by popular demand, the first family event of the year was Marine Mammal Madness in July. Otherwise known as the Dolphinwatch sports day, visitors had the chance to take part in several active games and challenges to learn about the special adaptations of saltwater mammals and see how their own skills matched up. Leaping like a dolphin in the long jump, diving into the limbo or racing their way through man-made threats in the obstacle course, participants were put through their paces in this competitive family fun day.

On 10 August, Detective Day will offer visitors the chance to dive into some food chain forensics to solve a series of mysterious clues and reveal the truth behind a perplexing crime scene. Aimed at children aged 7-12 years, this event will explore the wildlife food chain whilst introducing some iconic local species and building team working skills.

The season will finish with the Big Wildlife Picnic on 17 August, which will celebrate spending time with loved ones outdoors. Everyone will be invited to bring food, a picnic blanket and to take part in games and activities that will help them to discover and identify the wildlife around them.

The dedicated team of RSPB Scotland staff and volunteers will also be running rockpooling sessions on the last Saturday of every month and beach cleans on the last Sunday of every month. These activities will be led by a member of the Dolphinwatch team who will assist and support participants to get the most out of their experience and provide them with the necessary equipment.

The RSPB Dolphinwatch team also provide community outreach talks for local groups interested in learning more about the bottlenose dolphins seen in Aberdeen. These interactive sessions are bookable by contacting dolphinwatch@rspb. org.uk

Dolphinwatch viewing is free and runs every Thursday to Sunday from 11am until 5pm until 18 August.

Torry Memories and Heritage Society

On the 18th of May most members of our society visited the Gordon Highlanders Museum.

The members were divided in to three groups, with a tour guide. Each group was shown a film of the history of the Gordon Highlanders, and given a tour of the museum which included the armoury, the silver room and the officers' dining room. The tour guides were extremely knowledgeable and gave snippets of information and stories that are not included in the displays. Unfortunately due to the weather we were unable to view the new WW1 Replica Trench. We are working on a programme of talks and visits for the remainder of the year. We have two talks arranged. The next one is on Friday 13th September by Fiona Musk NHS Archivist for the Grampian Region. We are also trying to tie up dates for a talk on Thomas Blake Glover "The Scottish Samurai", and a return by popular demand of singer Donny Vass and other talks and visits. On the 13th of January 2010 a real Ambassador for Torry lost his battle with ill health, at the young age of 64. George Bruce Noble genuinely loved Torry and worked for the community on many levels, often behind the scenes and out of public gaze. Bruce, a resident of Wood Street, had retired from his TV repair business, and threw himself into all sorts of community projects. He was one of the founding members of the community council and saw it through some fairly turbulent times. He chaired the children's panel, carrying out vital and difficult work with children who need help at turbulent times in their lives. Not content with that he also was chairman of the school allocation board. He was a trusted friend and "go to" for many small fishermen who needed repairs to various electronic pieces of equipment, not just televisions. His love for things associated with the sea was probably born out of his father's love of the sea, and the fact that he had a vawl called "Jeanie Grey." Bruce himself had a small boat "Excellent Way" which he had placed at the bottom of his garden in Wood street, with

the idea of restoring it back to useable condition. Sadly, this very busy and motivated man did not manage to complete this job. Bruce and the late John Main became a very strong partnership while on the community council, and were involved in many community projects, like Christmas trees, lights, pocket parks, and many, many more.

Following his death members of the community including John Main decided that he should have a lasting memorial in the form of a bench near to Torry Battery and on the seaward side of the road.

It is somewhat ironic that John himself has been honoured in the form of a granite bench beside the stainless-steel cross near the battery. This has become a focal point of remembrance and comfort for lots of families who have loved ones who never came back from sea. Something which would have delighted John, whose family were all involved with the sea in many different ways.

Bruce's bench has recently had a refurbishment courtesy of two members of Torry Heritage Group.

Jim Fettes found the bench with its seat starting to rot and with thick tummocks of grass and litter all round it. First job was to clear all of the litter, mostly beer cans and bottles, amounting to about two bags. Then the thick unruly grass was cut back, and the ground lowered and levelled. The rotting wood of the seat was removed by Bill Esson, and new timber was ordered and prepared, before being given a several coats of good quality preservative and stain. I think we can all agree that they did an excellent job to restore the bench back to as new.

No community can afford to lose two such gentlemen, both of whom would modestly tell you that they were just Torry loons, and nothing special, but actually, both trusted colleagues, committed community workers, and proud of their heritage and surroundings. It is fitting that their memory lives on in these two benches, and it would be nice to think that the benches will be respected while being used by many who did not have the privilege of knowing either of them, and all that they did for Torry.

SCHOOL TERM AND SCHOOL CLOTHING GRANT INFORMATION

The next school term starts again on Tuesday the 20th of August 2019.

Apply for a school clothing grant

Aberdeen City Council can, in some circumstances, provide a grant towards the costs of school clothing and footwear if you receive certain benefits.

The current grant is £100 for both primary school and secondary school pupils. For pupils of statutory school age, the grant is paid to parents and for pupils over statutory school age the grant is paid to the student.

You can apply for a school clothing grant if you or your family receive any of these benefits:

- Income Support
- Income-based Job Seeker's
 Allowance (JSA)
- Any income related element of Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)
- Child Tax Credit (CTC), but not Working Tax Credit, and your annual income is less than £16,105
- Both maximum Child Tax Credit and maximum Working Tax Credit and your annual income is under £6,900
- Universal Credit, and your monthly income is not more than £610

- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Housing Benefit and/or Council Tax Reduction

You can only apply for children attending school or about to enter Primary 1. If you are an eligible student who receives an Education Maintenance Allowance you can apply for a school clothing grant for yourself.

PATHWAYS IN TORRY

A client contacted Stan our Pathways Keyworker who works in Torry for help as he found himself out of work for over a year due to a takeover of his previous employer. The client lived on his own with little support and was feeling a bit overwhelmed. Stan met with the client and reassured him that help was available and the first they did together was to review his CV and make it more appealing to prospective employers. Stan also helped with job search and identified several positions and together they applied for various jobs across Aberdeen. After a few false starts the client was successful in gaining an interview and a few days later was delighted

to find out that he had been successful and started working at the end of May 2019! The client said: "Pathways helped me when I was struggling and if I need help again, I'll call Stan."

Pathways have been actively working in Torry helping people to find work for over 15 years now and our Employability Keyworker, Stan Smith, meets with people looking for help at Old Torry Community Centre on Wednesday afternoons between 12.30 and 4pm. He is also at the same venue on Thursday afternoons from 1.00 to 4.00pm. As Stan is often fully booked it is always better to call for an appointment on **01224 682 939.**
